Fine Paid,-Last evening Commissioner McKay rendered his decision on the question as to whether Isaac Groo could be released without payment of the fine, in which he arrived at the conclusion that he could not. Mr. Groo's fine was therefore paid for him, and he was set at liberty, baving been confined 30 days longer than the period for which he was sentenced.

John Connelly Still in Custody .-One of those who should have been released from the Penitentiary to-day, whither he went for refusing to renounce a principle of his religion, was John Connelly, who was taken before Commissioner McKay this mornand examined by Dising. Attorney Dickson as to trict the amount of property owned by him. In the examination it was shown that Mr. Connelly at present owned no property, having, some time prior to his having been indicted, sold to his two wives, for a consideration, all the property held by him, amounting to about \$13,000. The Commissioner, however, would not discharge him, as he wished the question as to whether such a disposal of property could be made so near to the time of fluding an indictment to be passed upon by a higher court. Mr. Connelly was therefore committed to the Marshal's custody, and the matter will be brought up for hearing to-morrow, before Judge Zane, on a writ of habeas corpus.

The Davenport Case .-- The demurrer of the defendant in the case of The People vs. Fanny Davenport, for keeping a house of ill-fame, was argued before Judge Zane yesterday afternoon, the point at issue being as to whether counsel for defendant could enter a plea for their client or not. The matter was submitted to the Court, who took it under advisement, and this morning District Attorney Dickson moved that the plea of the defendant be taken, which was a virtual confession of the demurrer.

Judge Hoge, of counsel for the defendant, waived the reading of the indictment, and asked that a plea of not guilty be entered.

The Court asked, "Is the name in the indictment your true name?" cansing a general titter, and Mr. Hoge replied that it was the clerk's fault if it was not right.

Mr.Dickson then asked that the other indictment, charging the defendant with selling liquor in violation of law,

be read, but as Judge Hoge did not appear as counsel in that case, the matter was postponed until Monday. who, with a number of witnesses, was also taken charge of. In this case the complaint states that the defendants

Court—What is your age? Mr. Cannon—Twenty-four. Court—You state you did not know he was in the jury at the time you Salt Lake City.
