Important Conference Being Held At Washington at Gompers' Call.

SUBJECT OF WIDE EXTENT

set Court Decisions Which May be

Washington, March 18.—A conference of far-reaching importance to labor be-gan here today. Participating are President Gompers and the members of the executive council of the Ameri-can Federation of Labor, together with the executive officers of the Interna-tional Trades Unlons of America, who met pursuant to a call issued by Presi-dent Gompers to consider the conso-quences of the recent infunction de-cision of the supreme court of the United States, affecting labor organ-izations with particular reference to the Danbury hat cases in which that court substantially held that labor organiza-tions were to be considered trusts as much as organizations of capital. After calling attention to the signi-ficance of the decisions Mr. Gompers stated that the conference was for the purpose of "taking such action as the importance and merits of the subject determined as setting forth the pro-positions and demands of labor." Court rulings, he pointed out, were binding upon all labor organizations until changed or modified by congressional action. Washington, March 18 - A conference

NOBODY INJURED WHEN

BIG STEAMERS COLLIDE

New York, March 18.—The big trans-Atlantic steamer Kron Prince Wilhelm which arrived from Europe today was in collision with a steamer while com-ing up the bay. She is now lying at anchor in the fog off St. Georges, L. I., with a large hole in her stern. The Kron Prinze Wilhelm left quar-antine just before 7 o'clock this morn-ing on her way to her dock. She had on board 392 passengers of whom 229 were cabin and 163 steerage. In response to an inquiry by the As-sociated Press by Marconi wireless tole-graph, Captain Nierirch of the Kron Prinze Wilhelm sent the following mes-sage:

sage: "Crown of Castile ran into us, nobody (Signed.) NIERIRCH."

The Crown of Castile, of the New York Continental line arrived from Hamburg and Rotterdam last night and left quarantine at 7:15 a. m. today, about 15 minutes after the Kron-Prinze Wilhelm, and must have over-taken the other steamer while she was moving slowly in the fog. The Crown of Castle is loaded with merchandise, but carries no passengers.

but carries no passengers. The gash in the Kron Prinze's stern is in the overhang, directly over the name plate. Several of the plates ap-pear to have been cut through and oth-ers crushed.
