LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRE.—There were many people at the Theatre last evening, who appeared to appreciate the plays and the acting. The beautiful comedy of "The Wonderful Woman" was played in a spirited and creditable manner. Miss Adams as "Hortense," Mr. McKinnis as the "Marquis de Frontenac," and Mr. Margolis as "Grip the Cobbler," divided the honors, and elicited much applause.

The drama, tragedy we might say, of "A Hand of Cards" followed, in which the comedies of Messrs. Graham and Bowers as "Mr. Billy Tucker" and "Miss Jobbins" had considerable scope. The audience had the pleasure of seeing their homes in pitch darkness and darkness, and this evening there will be an entire change of performance, the drama will give place to vocal, instrumental and operatic music by the American Concert Troupe, in the course of which the theatre-going public will have the opportunity of hearing the performances of Master James Spang, the Child American, four and a half years old, most extraordinary performance for an infant artist.

The programme consists of two parts, the first comprising an Overture, Il Racio, Mollie Darling, the Echo song, selections from the Opera of Maria by the Child American, and Duetto Comique; the second embracing an Overture, Callie Herlin, I Would I Could Kiss Me and I Will Go to Sleep, Barney O'Hara, Duet from Home, and the Cuckoo Solo and other pieces by the Child American.

RETURNED MISSIONARIES.—Elders Thos. Lee, of Tooe Valley, and Alma H. Hale, of Grandville, returned from their mission to the States, the former April 7 and the latter April 6.

Elder Hale traveled in the States of Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Indiana and New York. He was well received generally, but people seemed much more anxious to make money than to think about religion.

Dr. J. E. Boyington came to this city with him, on a visit to this Territory.

While away on his mission, Elder Hale visited Far West, Missouri, and saw John and David Whitmer. The latter lives 30 miles southeast of Far West, and still sticks to his testimony concerning the Book of Mormon.

Elder Lee traveled in Missouri (visiting Independence, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, Michigan and Iowa), largely among his relatives, who received him very kindly, and from whom he gathered much valuable genealogical information. In many places he visited, the people possessed very limited information concerning "Mormonism," and many had never seen "Mormon." In Michigan much interest was manifested and quite a number expressed themselves in very favorable terms.

LEAKED.—The vacant ground on the opposite corner south of the Theatre, we understand, has all been leased for building spots for stores, etc., excepting fourteen feet frontage. The buildings will run back seventy-five feet. Mr. Smith of the Theatre, who was at the site this morning, surveying off the ground into various apportionments.

RUN OVER.—Yesterday afternoon a little girl, about eight years old, daughter of Brother George Anderson, was run over by a team and wagon on East Temple St., a few yards west of this office. Although she fell among the horses' feet, and the wagon passed over her, she was not hurt, to say, entirely unhurt. Fortunately she was between the wheels when the vehicle passed over her.

The driver of the wagon was reprehensibly reckless, there being a large number of people, who had just come from the Tabernacle, crossing the street as he drove down, yet he never slackened the speed of his team. Had the animals been walking instead of trotting, doubtless the little girl would have had time to get out of the way.

WILL REMOVE.—Mr. George Goddard has rented one of Mr. Hanham's new stores, on First South Street, and will shortly move there from his present stand near Hooper's corner.

MAIL INCONVENIENCES ON THE WEBER.—Two responsible citizens of Weber city called in to-day and made complaints of the irregularity of the mail in their district. They state that it frequently happens that the papers sent from this city go clear through to Omaha and back before they get to them, and when that is not the case it is quite a common occurrence for papers published on one day to reach their destination later than those published on the day following. There is considerable here which the proper authorities would do well to correct.

THE HOME MISSIONARIES.—We have been requested to state that the calling of Elders to Home Missions during the present Conference does not release those previously called to preach in the settlements.

DEAD.—William Van Valkenburg, better known as "Van," the same who was arrested on the 14th inst., charged with committing an assault and battery on John Cunningham, died about one o'clock yesterday afternoon, under very peculiar circumstances.

A coroner's inquest was held in the Court House this forenoon by coroner H. S. Beale, and a coroner's jury, to ascertain the cause or causes that led to his death, and a post mortem examination was being held on the body this afternoon.

The evidence adduced before the jury went to show that the deceased while in the City Jail showed symptoms of mental derangement, and that in consequence, a friend of his, a Mr. Pendleton, requested Marshal M. T. Patrick to endeavor to obtain his release from jail. Messrs. Pendleton and Patrick called on the jail, and as Van Valkenburg appeared to be crazy, the Marshal advised Mr. P. to call in a physician, and the services of Dr. J. M. Benedict were engaged accordingly. The Doctor prescribed some medicine for the deceased, the principal ingredient of which was morphine.

After this it appears that Mr. Pendleton engaged a man named Thomas Smith to wait upon the deceased, and requested of Mr. Wm. Hyde, the prison keeper, that (Smith) be permitted to wait upon the deceased, which request was granted. This was on Monday morning.

The evidence showed that Smith, during the course of the day, got intoxicated. Mr. Byron Green, one of the witnesses present once when Smith administered the medicine to Van Valkenburg, and thought he gave him too much, and remonstrated with Smith accordingly; the latter, however, insisted on giving it to him.

Towards evening, on Monday, the deceased became completely insensible, and was removed about midnight to his residence in the 15th Ward, where he died about the time he reached there.

Dr. Benedict, who visited the deceased on Monday night, was of the opinion that the condition he was in was induced by an over-dose of the medicine which he had prescribed, being mostly morphine.

Once, it appears, when Smith came to give some to the deceased about 8 o'clock on Monday evening, Mr. Hyde, seeing he was intoxicated, refused him admittance. Previously he had been admitted by Mr. Jonathan Needham by instructions of Mr. Hyde.

STREASAND.—Says a correspondent of the Sacramento Record, speaking of two recent book "exposés" of "Mormonism," "and yet the Mormon people are, to all outward appearances, unmoved by them."

Of course they are—who would think of being moved by the writings of criminals, hypocrites, money speculators, apostates, and traitors?

GETTING THROUGH.—The bunch of public assemblies of interest, which the past two weeks has brought forth, are pretty well through with. Conference is adjourned, the Republican convention and the Democratic Mass meetings are over, the bee-keepers and the school teachers have had their day, and the conference people have mostly started for home, and business will soon drop into its usual run. There is yet the interesting point of the U. S. Supreme Court decision to be heard of so highly suspenseful and put-off-ive as to remind everybody that "the law's delay" is not yet a thing of the past. The Democrats, too, expect another mass meeting or convention, as soon as it is known what the party at large mean to do about nominations for November. These two matters, the conclusion of conference, and State matters are the prominent objects of local public expectation.
