received \$1.75 per day while the

government was charged four to

A Steamship Escaped.

SAN FRANCISCO, 4.—A few days

ago the investigation by the Cen-

tral Pacific authorities of the defal-

cation of Woodruff, alias "the

No Session to be Held.

LONDON, 4.—It has been decided

that no session of the International

Prison Congress shall be held in

1876. The permanent prison com-

of Belgium, M. F. de Holland, and

others will meet at Frankfurt, to

receive reports for the consideration

of the Congress, which will be held

later, probably in Zurich.
