### LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Salt Lake Hotel Keepers' association will meet tomorrow evening, at the Wilson, to discuss matters of interest to the local fraternity.

Ogden City Councilman Moyer is improving at the L. D. S. hospital, from the serious injuries received Friday night, in falling from a street car.

R. T. Dunaway, recently district passenger agent of the Colorado Midland at Mantou, is at the Kenyon, en route to Portland for station there for his company.

The regular monthly meeting of state board of pardons will be held on Monday, April 17, instead of Saturday, April 15, which is Arbor day and hence a holiday.

Rev. Dr. T. W. Pinkerton will address the Women's club tomorrow afternoon, at the residence of Mrs. J. L. Bowman, 35 east Fourth South street, on the book of Job.

Rev. Dr. T. W. Pinkerton announced his resignation yesterday morning, to his congregation at the Central Christian church, and his intention to return to his former Ohio pastorate.

Mrs. Susan Joyce of Zanesville, Ohio, and James A. Ware of Ogden, were married yesterday afternoon, by Rev. D. M. Helmick of the L. D. S. church in the parlors of the Grand Pacific. Mr. and Mrs. Ware will live in Ogden.

The managers of local life insurance companies met Saturday night at the Commercial club, and decided to organize a state board of life insurance underwriters, to be called the Utah board of life insurance underwriters.

Rev. Dr. Martin of Mantle made an address yesterday morning, before the Utah State board of Christian Endeavor, and Miss Ada Harris of this city gave a recitation. The attendance from town and the institution was very good.

At Federation of Labor hall Sunday evening Henry W. Lawrence addressed a socialistic meeting on existing social conditions in America. His speech was a severe arraignment of child labor, which he styled a disgrace to humanity.

The resident members of the Delta Upsilon (non-secret) college fraternity, held a banquet Saturday evening, at the University Hotel. Dr. H. C. Goshen was elected president of the Salt Lake Alumni association, H. Blossom, vice president, and J. H. Siegel, secretary and treasurer.

W. H. Carlson, president of the Consolidated Bank of Los Angeles, is at the Wilson. J. E. White of 330 west Seventh South street, tried to jump from a street car late Saturday night, near his residence, and was thrown violently to the ground, by a misstep. He was knocked senseless, his face badly lacerated and four teeth knocked out by the concussion. The unfortunate man was quickly picked up and removed to his house where medical aid was summoned, and he recovered.

The Calvary Baptists (colored) are preparing a fine program for their jubilee to be held on the evening of the 24th inst., and their pastor, Rev. L. A. Brown, a fine vocalist himself, is training members of his congregation to take part in the musical part of the program. One of his singers, Mrs. J. D. Frost, was formerly one of the Flak Jubilee troupe. The entertainment will be held in Federation hall, the proceeds being for the benefit of the church.

Katherine Lorraine Plained, at one time a resident of Salt Lake who had taken up vaudeville as a profession, under the stage name of Katherine Lorraine, is receiving a large amount of advertising in the San Francisco papers. Their story is that she was engaged to wed Don Senor Robles, a Spanish bull fighter, but that before the ceremony was performed the Spaniard's manager produced a contract under the terms of which he was forbidden to marry while in his employment. The man has agreed to wait, it appears, until the end of the season before completing the match.

## AGREEMENT ON LIGHT FRANCHISE

Attorney Day and Judge Young Arrive at an Understanding On the Matter.

### CONCESSIONS ON BOTH SIDES.

Twenty-Two Franchises Will be Consolidated and Extended for a Term of 50 Years.

At a meeting of the municipal laws and special water committees in the city council chamber on Saturday night it was announced that City Atty. Day and Judge Young had agreed on the terms of the franchise for the Utah Light and Railway company by which its present franchises, 22 in number, will be consolidated and extended 50 years from Jan. 1, 1905. The principal concession granted by the company in addition to those agreed upon at former meetings of the committees is the furnishing of 40 horse-power of electricity in addition to that now being furnished to the city free of charge. This additional power will be used for pumping sewage and will save the city the expense of erecting a pumping plant for that purpose which means a saving of \$10,000 should the water committee decide not to build the plant. This company still holds to its agreement to reduce fares, and the cost of lights, give the city free lights for its buildings, also for the new library and the isolation hospital.

### NEW FRANCHISE IN BRIEF.

Following is the memorandum furnished by City Atty. Day of what the franchise will contain: First—The city shall ratify all agreements of franchise of the Utah Light and Railway company. Second—The city shall grant an extension of all franchises, 22 in number, for 50 years from Jan. 1, 1905. Third—The company shall be given until 1907 instead of 1906 to begin putting in annually four blocks of underground wire. Fourth—The city agrees to repeal all forfeiture clauses in existing franchises. Fifth—The city agrees not to use the power granted in competition with the company. For these rights and privileges the Utah Light and Power company agrees to make the following concessions:

### WHAT CITY GETS.

First—To reduce rates on electric lighting, gas and communication tickets of the street railway as agreed upon in the discussion before the committee during the week. The city shall have the right to fix a maximum rate for street lighting and other municipal purposes and shall receive free lighting as stated above. Second—The company agrees to convey water power and all rights along Big Cottonwood creek to the city. Third—The company agrees to provide for meter inspection and to keep the utilities of the company up to the standard of efficiency. Fourth—The company agrees to a reasonable penalty for violation of the provisions of the franchise in lieu of the forfeiture clauses in some of the old franchises. Five out of the six members of the committee present at the meeting voted in favor of the suggestions offered by Judge Day. Those who voted in favor of the franchise were: Daniel C. Hewlett, Dean and Prentice. Hobday voted against them. The committee will probably meet tomorrow afternoon and take final action on the franchise which will have been prepared by the city attorney by that time.

Stork Boarded the Cars on the Sanpete Valley Branch. Sunday afternoon the Rio Grande Western southbound local train was the scene of an unexpected visit of the stork, who left a bright little baby boy with Mrs. Kate Frisby of this city. In company with her mother, Mrs. Frisby left Salt Lake Sunday morning for the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Snydergaard, in Mt. Pleasant. Just after leaving Thistle Mrs. Frisby became aware of her delicate condition, which is thought to have been superinduced by the shock caused by the death of her sister at Bingham Junction Saturday, and the jar of the train. The smoking car was given over to the patient and her friends, and she was made as comfortable as possible for the ordeal. With the train running at full speed into Fairview station the little one was born, at Mt. Pleasant, a nurse and a doctor, and the mother and child removed to her parents' home.

At last report both are doing well and are out of serious danger. The child is the first to be born on a Rio Grande

train in this division, and L. A. Benton, general agent of the passenger department, contemplates offering it a souvenir in the shape of a mug or some other suitable token.

### DIED FROM INJURIES.

Chris Patero, Italian Section Hand, Who was Run Down by Train.

Chris Patero, an Italian section hand, died last night at the Groves L. D. S. hospital from wounds received Saturday. Patero was struck by a train on the Salt Lake & Ogden railway, near Beck's hot Springs. No one witnessed the accident, but it is thought that he was walking on the track and did not hear the noise of the approaching train, on account of the fact that another train was passing nearby. He was thrown from the track, receiving a broken leg, bruises about the head, and internal injuries. He was removed to the hospital and placed under the care of Dr. Baldwin of the railroad. He remained unconscious until his death last night.
