The khan bears a close resemblance to the ex-grand vizier, Amin Sultan, who the shah summoned from Paris to assist in combatting the revolutionary movement in Persia and it is thought that the assa sins were revolutionary emissaries. Three passers-by were wounded during the fusillade.

HEAVY SNOW IN NEBRASKA, KANSAS AND COLORADO.

Omaha, Neb., April 18 .- Five inches of snow fell during the night, and the storm continued during the forenoon. The fall was general over eastern Nebraska, and is the heaviest known in April for many years. The extent of damage, if any, is

is the heaviest known in April for many years. The extent of damage, if any, is not known. Opinion as to the effect upon fruit and early vegetables varies. In some counties, along the southern and central beits, cherries, peaches, plums and herries are said by some autiorities to have been ruined almost entirely, while other grow-ers report that fruit was not far enougn advanced to become seriously endangered. In grain circles it is believed the snow will kill all the green bugs that have been threatening the winter wheat crop and spreading over the central portion of the state.

A Norfolk dispatch says: "Northern Nebraska, southern South Dakota, northeastern Wyeming and the Black Hills are covered with a blanket of snow six inches deep upon the level, which is still failing. The snow is considered a henefit to small grain. frost being out of the ground."
