TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Railway Matters.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 6.—This afternoon
the directors' meeting of the C. & O.
D. Railway convened. Julius Dexter,
who had acted as chairman of the
stockholders' committee, which had
been conferred with Mr. Ives, said the
committee was not now ready to re-
port; that it proposed to go to New
York to make a further examina-
tion of the books, and it further
recommended that the board of direc-
tors adjourn and that another meeting
be held August 10th to hear the report
of the stockholders' committee. This
was agreed to and adjourned.

ACTION DEFERRED
until the meeting is held in New York.
The directors whose places will be
filled on Monday are Messrs. Cowan
and Wadsworth. Understood that
Emery and A. S. Winslow of this city
will be put in their places. No action
was taken on the proposition to
the P. Wayne road and guarantee its
stock, all that being postponed until
the present complications are settled.
President Sawyer was not present but
sent a telegram declining to resign.
This put a new phase on the proposed
reorganization. It was supposed he
would consent to retire and put the
management in Cincinnati hands.

CROCKER ON THE STAND.
SAN FRANCISCO, August 6.—Charles
F. Crocker, vice-president of the
Southern Pacific, was examined be-
fore the Railway Commission to-day.
Commissioner Tamm asked the ques-
tion how it was that certain large sums
of money had been paid without vouch-
ers, and was told a rather singular
proceeding.

Crocker did not think it was, saying
that explanations had been offered for
the expenditures, and that the board
was satisfied.

"Did you make these payments to
influence legislation?"
"I don't know," Crocker said.
Tamm repeated the question about
money being used for

LEGISLATIVE PURPOSES.
Mr. Cohen advised Crocker not to
answer.

"In my judgment, we can compel the
answering of that question," inter-
rupted Commissioner Anderson, "and
I advise your counsel to consider his
advice somewhat seriously."

Cohen asked that the question be
postponed until he could consult his
counsel, which request was granted.

NEW YORK, August 6.—In the suit
of the Oregon & Transcontinental Rail-
road Company against the Northern
Pacific Railroad, Judge Lacombe, in
the United States Circuit Court, to-
day granted the plaintiff's motion to
discontinue the suit, and set the
argument down for August 14th.

Weather Crop Bulletin.
WASHINGTON, August 7.—Following
is the weather crop bulletin of the
signal office for the week ending August
6th:

During the week ending August 6th,
the weather has been warmer than
usual throughout the agricultural dis-
tricts east of the Rocky Mountains, but
in the cotton regions and at stations
on the immediate A. and O. Gulf
coasts about the normal temperature
has prevailed. In the Mississippi and
Ohio valleys, the southern portion of
the cotton region, Kentucky, Indiana
and New York, the daily average tem-
perature was about 70 degrees.

Drought continues in the
states north of the Ohio Valley, but
there has been an increase of rain dur-
