## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Dance at Salt Lake**—The date for the dance to be given by the High school cadets at Salt Lake is set for April 27.

**The English Bible**—Prof. E. C. Gilbert lectured yesterday, before the State University on "The English Bible," and was listened to by a large audience.

**Young Cole Escapes**—Sheriff Emery received word yesterday afternoon that Willie Cole, who was committed from this county, had escaped from the Industrial school at Ogden.

**Scholarship Awarded**—Lester Anderson of Huntsville, a B. Y. university student, is the other Utah student to be appointed to a scholarship in the Oread institute, near Baltimore, Md.

**Fair in 1907**—Gov. Cutler has referred to the Commercial club the Sec. America First league, a request from the Jamestown, Va., exposition authorities that Utah be represented at their 1907 exposition.

**Extra Inspectors**—The resolution adopted by the city council on Tuesday night, authorizing the employment of 10 extra sanitary inspectors and five extra garbage wagons during the cleaning up season, has been approved by Mayor Thompson.

**Articles Filed**—A copy of the articles of incorporation of the B. & M. Investment company of Wyoming has been filed in the county clerk's office. Its capital is \$10,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$100 each. The incorporators are R. E. McConaughy, Glen R. Bothwell and Frank E. Loebe, all of Salt Lake.

**Will Be Prosecuted**—Parties who engage in cock fighting are to be prosecuted. This is the edict from the county officer T. A. Herlinger. He instances two such games that have been pulled off recently, one near Liberty Park and the other over Jordan. Some of the parties are known to him, and the officer intends to put a stop to the practice.

**In Honor of Bishop**—A ward party in honor of Oliver Hodgson, who recently retired as Bishop of the Third ward, will be given in the ward house tomorrow evening, and a most happy occasion is expected. An excellent program consisting of musical and literary numbers will be rendered. Bishop Hodgson holds a high place in the estimation of the people of the Third ward because of his faithful labors and his great generosity in furnishing most of the means in erecting the new meeting-house.

Miss Jessup has been in the regular service for two years, but owing to the rush for Nevada, work in the Utah surveyor general's office fell off so during the last year that it has been necessary for a large fraction of the employees in his office to try their hands at something else for the time being. However, the work is now picking up again.

**WESTERN MARKET LETTER.**

Special Correspondence.  
Stockyards, Kansas City, Mo., April 18, 1906.—Cattle from distant points were scarce last week, and nothing of this sort is here today, to speak of. One lot of good hay fed cattle from near Pueblo, 115 pounds, sold to killers at 4.50 last week. Prices on killing stuff remained about steady during the week. Many stockers and feeders sold higher last week than any time this season, a drove of 45 pound stockers from New Mexico, 5.00 the middle of the week, and a choice lot of native feeders, 96 pounds, sold at 5.15, the highest price of native feeders, or stockers, of this class of stuff was sold so far, as the demand from the country was very strong. Packers took the surplus at steady prices. Cows and heifers are 3 to 3.5 cents lower than at the best time of the season, but still bring remunerative prices, 3.25 to 4.75 for anything above canners or thin stock cows or heifers, which bring 2.25 to 3.25. Butts are selling well, 2.25 to 2.75 for bulk of sales. Fat steers are beginning to get scarce, and a rise on them would not be surprising, though not as big an advance as occurred last April, at which time prices were nearly 1.00 per cent higher than now. Veals are lower, at 5.00 to 6.50 for good ones.

Mutton prices are gradually advancing, market strong, cents higher today, supply 4,500 head. The run last week was 2,500 head, considerably below recent weeks, and the supply is likely to still further diminish, with prospects of strong markets. Fair to good woolled lambs sold today at 4.40 to 4.50, which did not represent the full strength of the market. Clipped stock will predominate from now on, clipped lambs selling today at 3.25 to 3.50, clipped wethers 4.75 to 5.00, clipped sheep and yearlings 5.25, woolled ewes 5.25 to 5.40. A hand of medium quality grass clipped Texas muttons, 76 pounds, sold at 4.50 today. Some 60 pounds poorly finished Monte Vista lambs went to the country at 5.50 last week.
