A Rare Flower. J. L. Maxwell, florist, of the Ninth Ward, has in his greenhouse a very

choice flower. It is the night-flowering cactus (cereus grandiflorus). It produces flowers of great beauty and sweetness. They begin to open between 7 and 8 o'clock in the evening and by 11 are in full bloom, lasting only for a few hours, when they close up and fade away never opening again, The calyx of the flower, when open, is nearly a foot in diameter, the interior, a brilliant yellow, the exterior being a dark brown, and the petals pure white. The usual season of flowering is in July.
