LITTLE GIRL DROWNED IN SWIRLING STREAM

Wilma Borg, Age Six Years, Misses Her Footing on Plank Used As Footbridge.

Wilma Borg, the 6-year-old daughter of Louis P. Borg of 80 Whitman avenue, met her death by drowning in Parleys creek last night. The little girl, while playing with a companion, fell into the creek near where the stream turns at Ninth East and Twelfth South streets. Although the body was recovered from the waters within a short time and before life was quite extinct, all efforts to resuscitate the child were futile and she died within a few minutes after being carried to her home nearby.

The accident occurred about 7 o'clock. Little Wilma in company with a playmate, Alice Youngdale, was crossing the stream over a narrow plank that offers a precarious footbridge. While her footing she toppled into the stream and was quickly whirled away. The twisting of the plank also threw Alice Youngdale into the creek, and a young man, who happened to be near the stream, who lunged into the water and succeeded in rescuing her.

Neighbors had notified the police and Patrolmen Conyers and McCormick were sent out. After a search they found the body of Wilma, caught in a clump of bushes a short distance from where she had fallen into the water.

The accident occurred not far from where Matthew Deemore, a 6-year-old boy, was drowned a short time ago.

DOG DUELS SNAKE TO DEATH.

Snoozer, Pet Terrier of Company B. Puts Reptile Away.

There was a unique duel at Fort Douglas yesterday afternoon, between Snoozer, the pet terrier of B company, Fifteenth infantry, and a big bull snake that had found its way from Red Butte canyon, and had gone to sleep on the turf back of the company barracks. The dog discovered and woke up his snakeship, which objected to his sista being disturbed and showed fight. The terrier was careful to keep out of reach of the snake's fangs. The battle, which took place near the tall, as the soldiers flocked out to see the fun and cheer the dog on. The contest lasted an hour, when the reptile got tired, and taking advantage of the sluggish movements, the terrier made a dash, and grabbed the snake by the neck. This ended the conflict and presently the snake was dead.
