A sporting writer on the San Fran-cisco Chronicle has taken upon himself the task of handing Billy Nolan a sethe task of handing Billy Nolan a se-vere roast, as follows: Billy Nolan has been much in evi-dence the past few days, not so much by reason of what he has said as be-cause of his don't care attitude with regard to the sports at large. Nolan may figure that what the world thuks has no bearing on him, but he will dis-cover before he travels much further, that is will make a difference in the end. No one can biame Nolan for looking after the best interests of Bat-tling Nelson, who is valuable, in that Nolan is entitled to a percentage of the profits. ting Nelson, who is valuable, in that Nolan is entitled to a percentage of the profits.
When Nolan, however, insists on conditions that are impossible, or such as to put a man in no shape to fight, then the public, which pays the bills, has a right to enter a vigorous protest. Although Gans made 181 pointies in Goldfield and defeated his man, he was veakened by the training. That he could do that weight in San Francisco is considered parctically impossible.
