## LOCAL BRIEFS.

Vice President Bancroft of the Oregon Short Line is in New York.

C. T. Thompson has returned to the Rio Grande as engineer in charge of bridges.

H. Westgard of the International Navigation company at New York was in the city yesterday.

The state board of education is considering this afternoon, applications for teachers' certificates.

The principals of the city schools are holding a meeting this afternoon in Supt. Christensen's office.

There was no organ recital yesterday, in the Tabernacle; but there will be one tomorrow afternoon, as usual.

Allen Lovey, the well known cartoonist, leaves tomorrow to accept a position with the Butte Intermountain.

Collector Callister is in the receipt of a bottle of the first peach brandy ever made in this state. It was made at the new Brigham City distillery.

The Postal Telegraph management has brought 28 linemen to stave wires in this city, and in one week the work is expected to be completed.

It is reported at Ogden that the Southern Pacific is to resume charge of the road from Reno to Ogden on account of the fact that the work of operating the division is too much for one man to handle.

R. H. Channing, Dr. D. Moore Lindsay and Fred Judge, who returned yesterday from a hunting trip to northern Montana, report that they bagged one elk, and eight mountain goats. Lindsay brought down the elk, but each of the men reached a mountain goat.

John M. Walker becomes superintendent of telegraph of the Rio Grande system on Oct. 1. W. B. Glendon, the present superintendent, having resigned to go with the Peru-Marquette system. Walker was formerly chief train dispatcher of the Rio Grande.

A street car struck a woman at Main and Second South streets yesterday afternoon, and knocked her down with the three-year-old daughter she was carrying in her arms. The car fender, however, being elastic, did not hit the woman so as to hurt her, and she and the child were picked up uninjured.

City Engineer Snow has received instructions to proceed with the survey of east South Temple street preparatory to paving the same, and work will be commenced at once. On account of the great amount of grading to be done on the street, it is not likely that very much will be done toward the paving this fall.

Word from the Twelfth Infantry at Guimaraes island reports that Asiatic cholera is epidemic in the islands, and strict military quarantine has been declared. A number of the members of the Twelfth, when stricken with the disease, died in a very few minutes. The surgeons are so overworked that they are on the verge of collapse.

The Retail Butchers' and Grocers' association have decided to hold a social dance on Monday evening, Oct. 3, at the association's hall, in the Jennings building, Main and First South streets. The hall will be decorated for the occasion and preparation will be made for a large crowd of merry-makers. In charge of the arrangements is a general committee, consisting of R. Papworth, E. C. Allen, F. H. Weight, J. A. Ekman, and Benjamin Fullmer.

## NOVEL EXHIBIT.

School of Mines, U. of U. to be at State Fair.

The school of mines of the University of Utah is to adopt a novel method of exhibiting at the State fair. It will move down from the university a section of its laboratories, students and all, and establish a regular system of work there. Credit will be given students who work just the same as at the regular laboratories, and the same regulations will govern. Several wagonloads of machinery and laboratory supplies will be sent to the exposition within a few days and set up there by student labor.

## LOOPER'S BAD FALL.

Second Accident at Salt Palace—"Dare Devil" Edwards This Time.

"Dare Devil" Edwards received a bad fall last night while leaping the gap at the Salt Palace carnival. He passed the gap all right, but something went wrong in the landing stage, and he fell to the ground with great force. His head was cut, and he was injured internally. It is not thought his injuries will be serious, but they will confine him to his bed for some days. This is the second accident he has had since beginning his act in Salt Lake, and his looping the loop in a ball in last year covering from a bad shake up from the breaking open of the ball in the landing net.

## LOST IN IDAHO.

Five Guides Searching Mountains for Father of Dead Boy.

A special from Canon City, Colo., to the Denver News says:  
Five experienced guides are searching the mountain fastnesses in Idaho for Dr. E. N. Carrier, whose 3-year-old son Edward died here this afternoon. Two of the guides have returned to Darby, the outfitting point of the hunting party, without finding any fresh trail. The other three hardy mountaineers have been out several days, and because they have not yet returned it is thought that Dr. Carrier and Mr. Wilson must have gone far into the mountains, or that possibly one of them has met with an accident.

Some even suggest that the hunters are lost, but this is unlikely, since their guide is a thoroughly experienced and cautious man, who has lived in that section of Idaho for 30 years.

The situation is particularly trying for Mrs. Carter, whose grief over the death of her baby would be hard enough to bear without the added anxiety over her husband's safety. The first of this month Dr. E. N. Carrier and E. A. Wilson left for a month's hunting trip in Idaho.

They outfitted at Darby, then plunged into the forest with their guide. They left instructions for another guide to come into the wilderness after them in case telegrams came from either.

When it was apparent that the doctor's child was dangerously ill last Tuesday several telegrams were sent to different points in the vicinity of Darby, and messengers were started into the forest from Darby to locate the two hunters.

Since then a dozen telegrams have been dispatched and other messengers sent into the woods, but as yet there is no evidence that Dr. Carrier has returned, or that the death of his favorite child and only son.

## WERE RELEASED FOR CAUSE.

Stowe's Place as Clerk is Being Temporarily Taken by Gaard Andrew Ure.

Guards Ed Janney, John Stowe and Henry Taggart have been released from service at the state prison, by Warden Pratt, for cause. Warden Pratt was asked for the details, but he courteously declined and preferred to say nothing further than state the fact that they had been released. Ed Janney is well known in this city, having been prominently identified with the Liberal cause during the ever memorable campaign of 1890-91, and was later a sergeant on the local police force for some years. Stowe has been so long clerk of the prison that the memory of the oldest resident "runners" not to the contrary. Taggart was an extra guard, and served in various departments of the city service before taking his position at the prison. Stowe particularly will be missed by visitors to the institution. His place is taken for the present by Guard Andrew Ure.
