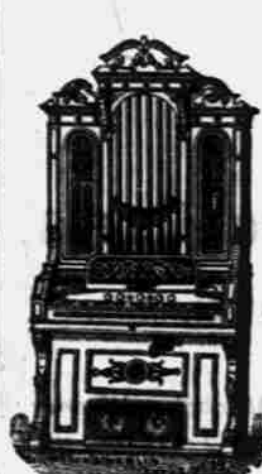

Last Night's Dispatches.

EASTERN.

Wool.

BOSTON, 4.—The demand for wool is

steadily but moderately. The stocks

of wool are becoming less every

week. Medium grades are already

scarce and wanted, and fine wool

will soon be in the same position,

all the desirable stock is therefore

held with considerable firmness,

and it is only the depressed state of

the goods in the market that inter-

feres with an upward movement

in price. The production of goods

has been so much reduced that the

manufacturers may soon be able to

have more control over prices. In

California wool the sales have been

at 38 @ 42 for spring, and 21 @ 26

for fall, and the latter, like the

slow sale on account of the poor

condition of the lots offering.

15,000 Democratic Majority.

CHICAGO, 5.—The results of the

congressional election in Illinois,

outside of the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd dis-

tricts, based on returns up to mid-

night, are given below, the majori-

ties being in nearly every case in

round numbers: 4th district, Hurl-

burt, rep., 10,000; 5th, Burchard,

rep., 5,000; 6th, Henderson, rep.,

3,000; 7th, Campbell, independent

rep., 3,000; 8th, Fort, rep., 5,000;

9th, Whiting, rep., 235; 10th, Bag-

ley, dem., 1,500; 11th, Elke, dem.,

4,000; 12th, Spinger, dem., 1,500;

13th, Stevenson, dem., 1,000; 14th,

Cannon, rep., 800; 15th, Eden,

dem., 2,000; 17th, Morrison, dem.,

4,000; 18th, Israel, dem., 1,000;

19th, Anderson, independent dem.,

2,000; in the 1st district Caldwell,

dem., is elected by a majority of

5,000 to 6,000; in the 2nd district

the democratic claim that Harrison

is elected by 7 votes, and the re-

claim that ward is elected by 11

votes; in the 3rd Farwell is

now reported to be defeated

by 29 votes, but official returns

are necessary to determine.

On this basis of majorities the de-

mocrats have a net majority of 12,000

or 14,000 in the State, which will

probably be increased to 20,000.

The Result in Virginia.

RICHMOND, 4.—The conservatives

have certainly elected Walker to

Congress in the third district,

Tucker in the fifth, Harris in the

seventh, Hutton in the eighth,

Terry in the ninth; the republicans

have elected Sewell in the fourth.

Democrats Elected.

LITTLE ROCK, 4.—The returns

indicate that Gans is certainly

elected in the first congressional

district, Clemans in the second,

Whitely in the third, Gault in the

fourth. These are democrats.

Hynes, rep., carries Pulaski co.;

he had 750 majority.

The State Ticket.

DETROIT, 4.—The Senate has two

three democratic majorities; the

House is claimed by both sides by

six or eight majority.

Democracy in Pennsylvania.

PITTSBURGH, 4.—Fuller returns in

Allegheny county show that both

congressional districts elect de-

mocrats, while the legislative de-

legation stands 11 democrats to six

republicans, while the entire de-

mocratic county ticket is almost

certainly elected. The latest returns

from Western Pennsylvania in-

dicate that democratic Congressmen

are elected in the 17th, 18th, 20th,

21st, 22nd, 23rd, 25th, 26th and 27th

districts. In five of the western

counties the democrats elect eight

assemblymen. It is barely possible

that the republicans will have a

small majority on the joint ballot

in the legislature.

\$40,000 Fire.

DUBUQUE, 4.—A fire here to-

night, destroyed a block of build-

ings in the lower part of the city;

loss \$40,000.

Missouri Undoubtedly Demo-

cratic.

ST. LOUIS, 4.—The returns are

meagre as yet, but the State is un-

questionably gone democratic.

Wall Street Unsettled.

NEW YORK, 4.—In Wall Street

to-day, the result of the elections

was the topic of discussion, and

market was somewhat unsettled,

and in consequence the markets

were higher for exchange, weak

and lower for stocks, and tempo-

rarily firmer for gold.

Democratic Congress.

Tables made up to-night of the

members elect to the next U. S.

House of Representatives show a

democratic majority of 56, as re-

ported.

Pennsylvania Cons Democratic.

Pennsylvania is believed to have

gone democratic by 3,000 to 5,000

with sixteen democratic and seven

republican congressmen.
