27, 1904: The week opened with temperature about normal; on the 22nd began a period of unusually cool weather which cuiminated in frosts over the greater portion of the state on the 24th and 25th. Some snow fell in the mountains on the 23rd, and a few local showers oc-cuired in eastern counties, but the geat-er part of the state was practically without precipitation throughout the week; high winds were prevalent in ex-posed rortions during the cool period. By the close of the week the tempera-ture had again risen about to normal. CENCPS

#### CROPS.

CROPS. Fruit-Some fruit was killed in ex-treme no: thern and southeastern locali-ises by the frost of the 24th and 25th, and a few cherries were bruised by the wind, but in general the fruit crop was unharmed, though development was somewhat retarded by cool weather; the strawberry season is practically over in southwest valleys, but markets are still abundantly supplied with cher-ries; atrawberries and cherries are rip-ening in more elevated sections. Grain-Notwithtstanding the absence of precipitation over much of the state, damage from drouth appears to be con-lined to snall areas, and grain is mak-ling very good progress in most sec-tions: damage from frost in elevated castern districts is much less serious than appressed at first, heading of spring grain is becoming general in southwest valleys.
