#### ADOPTS ADVERTISING.

Southern Utah Wants Her Resources Set Forth to Encourage Capital.

Set Forth to Encourage Capital.

The Cedar City Commercial club has a mining committee which is devoting its time, energy and ability to advertising the mineral resources of southern Utah. Stories are being published in newspapers throughout the state in an effort to attract capital and encourage development. The publicity scheme is a good one as the district has the resources to return four to every dollar invested. Wonderfully rich in minerals, especially iron and coal, Prof. J. S. Newbury of Columbia School of Mines, N. Y., some years ago said in his report on the iron regions of Iron county: "They constitute perhaps the most remarkable deposits of iron yet discovered on this continent."

The iron ore beds form a series of protruding crests and masses over an area of about 10 miles long and having a width of from three to five

miles.

E. D. Wassell of Pittsburg Pean., in part report said:

"I am surprised beyond what I am able to express at the great mineral wealth of Iron county, Utah, abounding as it does with Iron ore and coal. There are different classes of iron ore in Iron county quite sufficient to guarantee success in the smelting operations of a blast furnace. The lowest grades will not yield less than 45 or 50 per cent and others of a higher grade will yield 70 per cent of metallic iron. John McVicker, assayer of Salt Lake City, analyzed samples of what is known as the Blowout ore giving 67.9 and 71.4 per cent of metallic iron. Three samples analyzed by Walter S. Maxwell of Los Angeles, by Thomas Price and Sons, San Francisco, Cal., gave the following results, viz. No. 1, 62.4 per cont, No. 2, 69.1 per cont, No. 2, 67 per cent iron. It is of the same character as the ore used for the production of the well known brand valled. Norway iron."

J. Blodget Boltton of Philadelphia, Penn., gave the following as the result of the analysis of four samples of miles. E. D. Wassell of Pittsburg Penn., in

yalled Norway iron."

J. Blodget Boitton of Philadelphia, Penn., gave the following as the result of the analysis of four samples of the iron ore of Iron county, Utah: "Dunkin, 66.69 iron; Pot Metal, 68.89 iron; Chesapeake, 67.48 iron; Blowout, 64.52 iron." There are three kinds-of iron ore and other metal in the Blowout, the greater part being very fine ore.

Prof. William P. Blake of Connecticut in his report said: "Permit me to call your attention to the possibilities of an enterprise in coal, iron, steel and railroads, which appear to me to offer extraordinary inducement to capital for investment.
