No further communications from [mining companies, as to their financial condition, have been received by the Salt Lake Mining and Stock Exchange and in consequence this morning's call was of the routine kind. Clarence McCornick is reported to have promised, however, to give out statements as o Carisa and Tesora, and their forthcoming is awaited with considerable interest. Mr. McCornick expresses con fidence in the ability of the latter to reestablish itself as a favorite investment, and of the former he speaks in the highest terms.

With the exception of California, most of the stocks fell off a little in price and the question now is, have not the stocks just about reached the bottom of their decline?
