**ANSWERS LAST CALL**

Indefatigable Pioneer of Weber  
And Nauvoo Veteran Goes  
To His Rest.

Ogden, Jan. 11.—Joseph Bonapart Alvord has passed from mortality to a well-earned reward after a life of 77 years spent in usefulness and endeavor to build up Weber county. He died Thursday evening, Jan. 9, at his home at West Weber, from general debility, after a brief illness. Decades ago he was the son of Thaddeus and Elizabeth Briggs Alvord. He was born in Waterford, Michigan, Dec. 4, 1830. When eight years of age he was baptized into the Latter-day Saints' church and from that day to his death was true and faithful to his religious convictions, always taking an active part in the advancement of the church. He passed through all the privations and hardships experienced at Nauvoo, and other places, in 1849 when he came to Utah, arriving at Salt Lake City Oct. 17. The following year he removed to Weber county and has lived here ever since. He made two trips across the plains in assisting in bringing handcart companies over. Being one of the pioneers of this county he has been active in helping to build up industries and the country in general. He served on one of the county school boards for several years. He was a member of the high priests' quorum of the Weber stake at the time of his death. In 1889 he was married to Sarah E. Mower, with five children, 11 grandchildren, and two brothers, survive him. The funeral services will be held Monday, at 11 o'clock, at the West Weber ward meetinghouse. Burial will be made at West Weber.

## GRAND SUCCESS OF CONCERT.
