#### Bloomington.

At 8 and 8.30 o'clock the church bell was rung, and at 9 o'clock the citizens met in a neatly-built bower, and were called to order by Fritz L. Johnson, marshal of the day. The singing was executed by the Sunday school, conducted by Prof. Greenhalgh; prayer by Bishop Hulme, chaplain; oration by Prest. J. H. Hart, after which a recitation was given by the marshal; Prest. George Osmond delivered an appropriate address; many of the old-timers spoke. At 11 o'clock we were dismissed by the chaplain.

By 12 o'clock the sisters of the Female Relief Society had a very tempting dinner prepared, of which all that could be present partook with general satisfaction.

At 2 o'clock the Sunday school children assembled in the hall and danced for two hours.

At 6 o'clock the citizens gathered and indulged in dancing until 11 p.m., when the ceremonies were closed, and all appeared satisfied. LEON.

#### BOX ELDER STAKE CONFERENCE.

The Quarterly Conference of Box Elder Stake of Zion was convened in the bower at Brigham City, Saturday, at 10 a. m., July 27th, 1878.

There were present on the stand, Lorenzo Snow, of the Quorum of the Twelve; O. G. Snow, President of the Stake, and E. A. Box, his first counselor; Wm. Box, Patriarch; a number of bishops and leading Elders from different Wards in the Stake.

After the opening exercises, Prest. O. G. Snow spoke on the duties and obligations of the Saints, and the necessity of bending their circumstances to suit those duties, and not suffer the circumstances to control them. The clerk read the statistical report of the Stake for the quarter ending May 31st, 1878.

Brother Bendt Jensen, returning missionary, remarked on the sad condition, spiritually, of the people of the world, their indifference to the truth, and spoke of the judgments of God which are hanging over them.

Prest. O. G. Snow presented the Church and Stake authorities, all of whom were unanimously sustained.

Several of the Bishops gave verbal reports respecting the spiritual and temporal condition of the people in their several wards, which were, in the main, favorable, showing

an increase of faith and good works.

2 p. m.

After singing and prayer the superintendents of the departments of home industries, gave a synopsis of the condition of the same. Bro. Jas. Pett stated that our woolen factory was burned down on the 21st of December, 1877, and that by unity of effort, and the blessings of God, we rebuilt it, procured fresh machinery, and had it running on the 4th of July, 1878; we have 30,000 pounds of wool on hand. The brush, cotton farm, hat, boot and shoe, mason and lumber departments were each represented by the superintendents of the same, stating that progress was being made, and that they felt well in their respective spheres of labor.

Counselor E. A. Box made a few remarks on the duties of employees to the employer.

Sunday, 10 a. m.

After singing and prayer, Elder F. R. Richards, who came by train on Saturday, after conference opened, addressed the assembly on the United Order, and congratulated the people of this Stake on the advancement made by them in the practice of those high and holy laws revealed by the Almighty, bearing on our social life and relations; he exhorted the people to continued faithfulness, until they had reached the perfection of the city of Enoch, and he urged unity on election matters.

Brother George Facer reported the sheep in good condition, and that they had now increased to over 8,600.

Brother Wm. L. Watkins made a few remarks respecting our home industries.

Prest. O. G. Snow announced the arrival of Elder W. W. Woodruff.

2 p. m.

After the usual exercises, the sacrament was administered.

Bishop Hess remarked on the blessings of the United Order, and the interest in which the people at large watch the efforts of the Saints in Brigham City in this matter.

Elder W. W. Woodruff spoke on the eventful age and generation in which we live, and the great work we have been ordained to, also the opening up of the various dispensations. His discourse was replete with valuable instruction and counsel.

Elder F. D. Richards gave a very interesting and instructive account of the great faith of the brother: of Jared, as recorded in the Book of Mormon, in the preparation of the barges to cross the sea, and the stones which were put in them to give light, and concluded by invoking the blessing of God upon Bro. Snow and all the Saints.

President O. G. Snow, stated that Wm. C. Heaton had been released by Bishop O. C. Hoskins and Counselors of Portage Ward, from his presidency over the 5th Quorum of Elders; the assembly voted unanimously to sustain their action.

President Lorenzo Snow made a few encouraging remarks and exhorted to increased faithfulness in the future.

Conference adjourned for three months.

The congregation rose to their feet and assisted the choir in singing "The Spirit of God like a fire is burning."

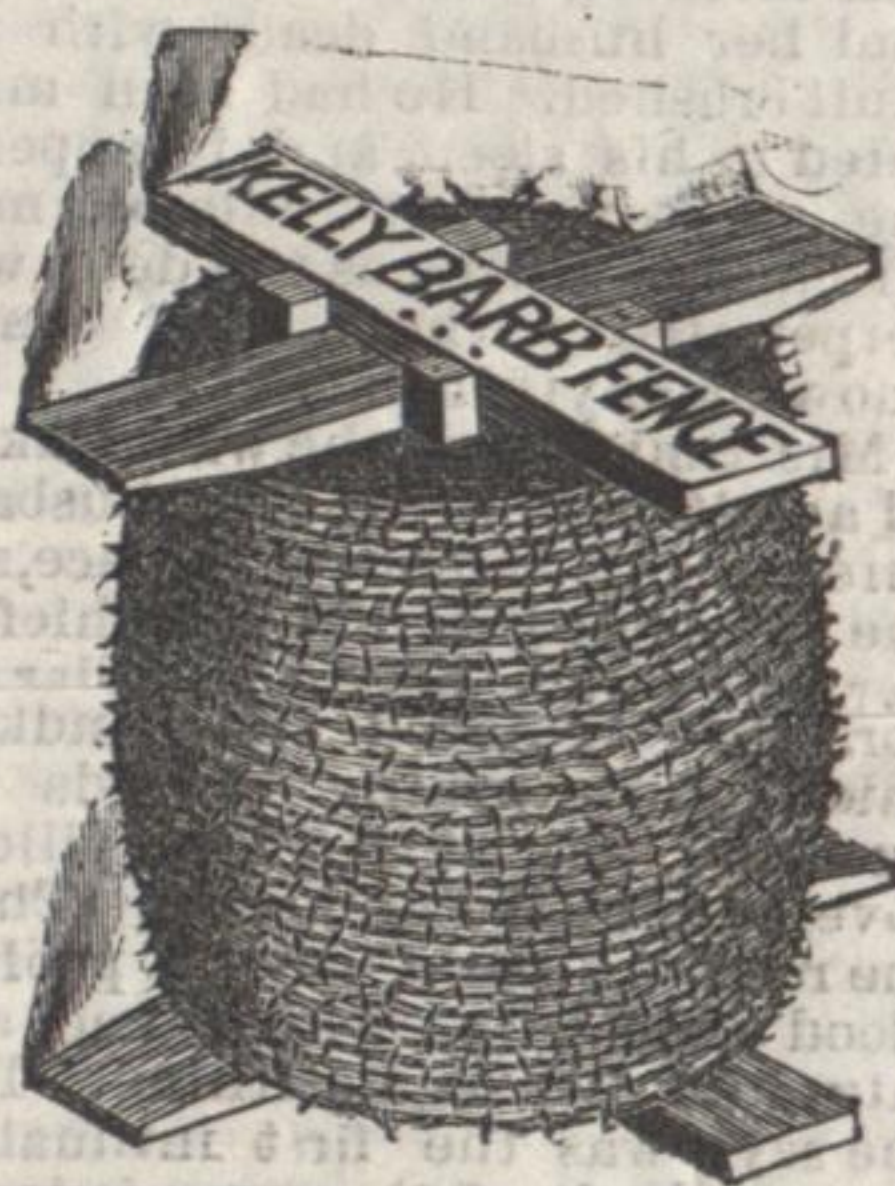
