MIXED animals descended from mixed races are not to be depended upon for breeding purposes. Characteristics of ancestors, even though remote, show a strong tendency to reappear. It is only where certain qualities are concentrated by a long line of close breeding that dependence can be placed with any certainty upon their reproduction. It is this peculiarity which distinguishes thorough-bred animals from others. There are animals of common breeds but in all probability this excellence will not be transmitted; they have a long line of low-bred progenitors, whose blood fills their veins and manifesis itself in their progeny. But the product of the thorough-bred always carries the seal of its parentage, and can be distinguished at a glance. The rule, therefore, which can be followed is that it is always safer to select a sire with a pedigree, even though meelf an inferior-looking; animalthan to take a more perfect-looking sire without a pedigree; for the pedigree will outweigh individual excellence. The chief requisite in a sire is the power to transmit to his progeny the psou-liarities which make his race famous, and the perpetuation of which deaired. [We have been favored with the copy of a letter written by Elder Orson Hyde and addressed to his friends in the East. The same and address of those friends are emitted.

ED. D. E. N. Gentlemen: Though not members of the Church to which I have the honor to belong, you cannot look upon matters connected with our history from the same standpoint that I do; yet, from the pleasant and joyous scenes that transpired with us when I was a resident of your city, I cannot forego the inclination of writing to you.

It is now a little more than eighteen years since I left your busy and flour-ishing town. The vigor of manhood then animated our bodies and our minds; and though our pursuits and professions were diverse, a kindly feelcontingency, and from considerations of our agreeable associations, I am impelled to the pleasant task of giving you further reasons why my faith increases in the truth of my religion

Then I was comparatively young and full of combativeness and zeal; but now experience has somewhat modified my feelings, and from a careful observation of men and things, I am taught calmnees, consideration and faith in the true and living God.

There is a tacit acknowledgement by the American Government that our religion cannot be disproved by the scriptures of the Old or New Testament, nor yet, by the highest order of talent in the nation, aided by all the sciences that can embellish that talent; and so, deepairing of the ability of men of science, erudition and theology to successfully refute it, they resort to penal enactments against its further development and progress. Now, the inquiry naturally arises: If men have not skill, learning, biblical knowledge and general intelligence to effectually expose its fallacy in the broad field of investigation, have they skill, learning, bibli-cal knowledge and general intelligence enough to enable them to enact laws sufficiently potent to impede the on-ward march of truth? If might were right, they possibly could accomplish it. Are not the people of the United States the fountain from which all con-Stringent enactments against us might

Some of you may yet remember that in the year '61, I published an article in the Missouri Republican, in which it was stated concerning the Southern rebellion, that the "demon of war would Monday Eve, March 13, rage on the American continent till the material in which he chose to operate was consumed,—then he would depart and take up his abode on the banks of the Rhine."
