"Much of the best plastic work of the fourteenth century is found in Nuremberg. The statuary and reliefs of the churches there are of considerable im-portance, and there is also the celebratfountain by Heinrich der Baller. the Augsburg museum is a series of fine wooden statues of this period. The bronze effigy of Archbishop Conrad in the Cologne Cathedral is of about the same date. With the fifteenth centur same a time of fresh artistic impulse and renewed activity: to this prolific epoch belong such works as the richly

carved stalls and the great pulpit of the Uim Cathedral by the Syrlins; the great panel by Stoss in the Nurembers townhall: Wohlgemuth's and Durer's carvings: Adam Krafft's Schreye monument for St. Sebald's church i Nuremberg, and his immense taber nacle, eighty feet high, covered wit with statuettes, for the Uim cathedral. The Vischers, who flourished during the fifeenth and sixteenth centuries, were mong the great sculptors of Germany. The elder Vischer's principal survivin works are the brenze front at Witten berg church, and four effigies in relief In Bamberg cathedral. The chief works of his son Peter, the greater artist, are the shrine of St. Sebald at Nuremberg, the Entombment relief in the Aegid-ienkirche, the Cardinal Albert monu-ment at Asebaffenburg, the tomb of Frederick the Wise in the castle chapel at Wittenberg, and the bronze statue of King Arthur of Britain at bruck. In these works Peter Vischer was assisted by his sons. The great series of twenty-eight colossal bronze statues at Innsbruck, around the tomb of Emperor Maximilian, are for the most part anonymous.

"The Augustus fountain at Augsburg and the Hercules fountain in the same city, by Gerhard and De Vries respecively, belong to the end of the six-centh century. The seventeenth and ighteenth centuries in Germany were periods of relative inactivity in the plastic art, and not much of merit was produced. The next revival occurred n the last half of the eighteenth century, when the classic style came into vogue. Gottfried, Tieck, Rauch, Drake, Wolff, Kiss, Kalida, Rietschel, Haaren, Wichmann, Fischer, Hiedel, Hannel. Schwanthaler, are among the note-worthy names of the last century, and bring us up to the contemporary artists in whose work the emperor takes such
