The night was an anxious one; the dis-tinguished patient seemed to have grown weaker and weaker and the the chances of his recovery less and less as the hours dragged slowly along. Indeed he was so low in the early hours this morning that the attendants almost abandoned all hopes. The history of the case shows that the most dangerous time for the General is between the hours of 2 and 6 in the morning, and this morning was no exception to the rule. All the physicians and nurses were with him during that period, and the discourag-ing news that came from his bedside from time to time flied the anxious watchers with grave fears. At 3:30 p.m. Col. Blount reported the condition of General Sheridan as unchanged. All the members of the Cabinet, except Secretary Endicat, who is out of the city, called at the house during the forencon. The President sent a messenger twice during the day and expressed an earn-est desire to be promptly advised of any change in the General's condition.
