

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRICAL.—On Saturday night there was a rather slim house to witness the really very excellent bill prepared for the occasion. Buckstone's famed drama "Luke the Laborer," was the first piece presented, and having heard so much about it, and of the local celebrity formerly attained by the gentleman personating "Luke," we went prepared for a good time; but the old saying, that anticipations are seldom realized, was verified on this occasion. Mr. Marquette is an excellent comedian, but his conception and rendition of "Luke," on Saturday night was not equal to what he is capable of.

Mr. Graham kept the house laughing each time he appeared; but his "Bobby Troy," we think was not the country bumpkin of Buckstone. Messrs. Thorne and Mackintosh, the former as Farmer Wakefield, the latter as "Phillip, a Sailor," rendered tolerable justice to their respective roles. The piece would have been much improved, if the ladies and gentlemen had been better up in the text of their respective characters, and seeing that the performances are only twice a week now there is no excuse for deficiencies of this kind.

The Comedy of "Naval Engagements," went with more spirit than the first piece; but we have seen it presented on the whole, on former occasions here, better than it was on Saturday evening.

DIED.—At the Executive Office in this City, Oct. 31st, 1870, at 5:15 a.m., of consumption, after a lingering illness, Governor J. Wilson Shaffer. Deceased was a native of Pennsylvania. He was born July 5th, 1827. For the last twenty-two or twenty-three years his residence has been in Illinois, until he came to this Territory on the 29th of last March. He served the government in a military capacity, principally as chief of General Butler's staff, during the late civil war between the Northern and Southern States. His remains will be conveyed to his late residence in Freeport, Illinois. They will be escorted to the railroad depot on Monday afternoon, by the masonic fraternity and the military of Camp Douglas.

Flags at half mast are on all the principal buildings of the city to-day, as a token of respect to the deceased.

THE BENEFIT AT OGDEN.—The Junction of Saturday says that the theatrical benefit of Mrs. M. Bowring, at Ogden, on Thursday evening, was a complete success in every sense. There was a full house on the occasion and the gentlemen and ladies who took part in the performance, did full justice to the pieces produced. "Uncle Tom's Cabin" and the married Rake. Mr. W. C. Dunbar did not return from the North in time to impersonate "Mr. Cate," for which character he was cast. Mr. H. Bowring played in his stead and, according to the Junction, made a decided hit.

DISTRICT COURT.—The District Court, for the Third Judicial District, met this morning at ten o'clock. Out of respect for the memory of Governor Shaffer, deceased, the Court adjourned till Wednesday morning.

The Grand Jury was adjourned sine die, only four having answered to their names this morning.

Rank was tried for the murder of one Roach, at Genoa, about a year ago.
