COMPLAINT OF THE CONDUCT OF A POLICEMAN.

A. H. Kelly represented that on the afternoon of January 4, he was standing in front of the Gladstone building on Main Street, conversing in an ordinary way with Messrs. Belton and Nevin, two of his employees. He was a man in the uniform of a police officer, named Siegler, but better known as Melton, roughly ordered the plaintiff to stop, and when he waited for a moment and then placed the petitioner and Mr. Nevin under arrest and marched them off to the City Hall. He caused vagrants, prostitutes, and other undesirable persons to be arrested in the city nearly all his life, and during his entire career he was never heard of. When the officer placed him under arrest, he evidently intended two gentlemen who were attending to their business affairs and also carrying a large amount of money. It is evident that he was not a gentleman but a scoundrel, a swindler, and a thief, and in the interest of decent people of this city, your petitioner demands that this officer be stripped of his uniform and dismissed from his position.
