### RACE FOR PENNANT.

Interest in All Other Sport Over-shadowed by Baseball Fight.

New York, Sept. 29—Interest in all other branches of sport this week will be overshadowed by that focused on the brilliant race between the leading teams of the American and National Leagues for the winning of \$300 and the honor of meeting the Chicago club of the National league for the world's championship early next month. Detroit, 26, and New York, 25, won 18 games and 36 lost, and Philadelphia, with 31 games won and 35 lost, a percentage of .86 for the former and .89 for the latter. Chicago is third in the race with 24 wins and 32 losses, and Boston, with 23 wins and 33 losses, is fourth.

Tomorrow Philadelphia and Detroit will play a double-header at Philadelphia, after which Detroit will jump to Washington for four games and return to St. Louis for four. Only one game will be won by Detroit in the capital city this season and Manager Jennings is hopeful that this high percentage of victories will be maintained. In St. Louis, however, things have not always been rosy for Detroit.

After Detroit leaves the Philadelphia will visit and the Cleveland on their home grounds for four games and then will go to Washington for three.

### KELLY AT MICHIGAN.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Sept. 29—Dan Kelly of Louisville, 135, A. C., sporting champion reached Ann Arbor tonight and arranged to matriculate in the university tomorrow.

Kelly has a record of 39-3 for the past two years and although this mark has been questioned, it has been allowed to stand. He has covered the 30-yard dash in 34-1/2 and has a mark of 21 feet 6 inches for the running broad jump.

Kelly's addition to Michigan's track squad has made up for the loss of Garrels and increases the Wolverines' chance of wresting the eastern championship from Pennsylvania at the next inter-collegiate games.

The Ogden High School football team made a splendid showing against the University of Utah team at the Junction City on Saturday afternoon. The game ended with a score of 19 to 0 in favor of Maddock's men but the lighter team did excellent individual and team work.

The U. of U. team showed a lack of organization and several times the signals were bungled, but, of course, this will be corrected as the season advances. The boys have not been together long enough to get down to perfect team work. Several new plays were tried but in the main the bunches played straight football, forward passes were tried and in each instance were successful. At one point early in the game when Utah had the ball on Ogden's 30-yard line the home team held the other eleven yards down. In the second half the boys were held several times for down and again made some good gains.
