The surface of the dry land sinks

The surface of the dry land sinks to a level below that of the ocean in six places, viz: The Salton basin in San Diego county and Death valley in Inyo county, Cal.; the valley of the Jor-dam in Palestine, where the Dead sea is nearly 1,406 feet below sea level; two small areas in the Sahara desert of northern Africa; and-larger than all others together-the valley of the Caspian sea in western Asia, which Caspian sea in western Asia, which is 86 feet lower than the Black sea. The Salton basin, once connected directly with the Gulf of California, has been gradually closed in by slit from the Colorado river. A complete barrier was forming at last shutting off the basin from the basin from both guif and river, and separ-ating a lake that soon disappeared through evaporation. In times of heavy rains the silt is sometimes cut through rains the silt is sometimes cut through, though only at long intervals. The last flooding in this way was in 1831-92, but in the spring of this year the opening of an irrigation canal left a breach, through which the summer flood has poured a lake of many square miles. With the foothold gained, this new body of water may remain a long time before silting and evaporation again before silting and evaporation again leave a dry basin.

The success of tantalum as a material for electric-lamp filaments has drawn attention to the remarkable properties of the metal, and may lead to many de-mands if the supply can be sufficiently increased. Chief of these properties, as Dr. Moellroo Perkin points out, is ex-treme ductility combined with extraordinary hardness. A diamond drill, rotating 5,000 times a minute for three days and three nights penetrated only

a quarter through a sheet of tantalum one twenty-fifth of an inch thick, and the diamond was much worn. This hardness suggests the use of the metal for drills in place of the diamond.

The apparatus used by this par-ticular tribe is a kind of drum, con-sisting of a goard with a head of dried kid skin, and the sounds from this are heard at distances of five to eight niles. Messages are sent by a secret ode of drum-beats serving the same purpose as the Morse alphebet. A special corps of signalers is always on duty, and when a message is sounded it is promptly received and passed on to the desired village, when it is delivered to the proper person. This system is used for distances of at least a thousand miles. Messages forward-ed to missionaries were unfailingly and accurately delivered, and the events of the Boer war were made known to the missionaries by goard line hours before they received the news by field telegraph
