The car track is being raised to the established grade, on the same street.

**A Remarkable Undertaking.**—We have had the pleasure of an interview with Sister Sarah A. Church, of St. George, who recently returned from a journey to the Southern States, upon which she started from here on the 18th of last June. She left Salt Lake in company with Elders Scott and Bean, outgoing missionaries, the former from Provo, the latter from Richfield. Her object in visiting the States was partly to see her friends and relatives there and go to her husband's grave, he having died in Tennessee while on a mission there about five years ago; but her main purpose was to get her younger sister and bring her to Utah. Sister Church is a widow who works for her living, but is careful, thrifty and diligent, and by this means raised sufficient money to emigrate her sister some time ago. She purchased a railroad ticket and sent it east to Elder W. C. Staines, with her sister's address, that the latter might be notified by him as to how, when and where she should meet the train on its way to Utah, and take passage thereon. After having sent the ticket back, and Mr. Staines having fulfilled his portion of the business, Sister Church received word from her friends in the Southern States that her sister was unable to travel west alone, as she was somewhat of an invalid and not in a fit condition to undertake the journey. Whereupon, the brave woman immediately set about preparing to go east herself and accompany her sister west. She did so, as stated, first visiting Tennessee, where her husband is buried, and then following down the Mississippi to within 200 miles of New Orleans, to the place where her sister was living. She accomplished her mission successfully, brought her relative home with her, and is now on her way to St. George, her place of residence. Those who know Sister Church, and she is widely known among the Saints as a "brave, true-hearted adherent of the faith," will not be surprised at hearing of her latest act of goodness, as it is in perfect keeping with her character, but to others, a deed so full of love, courage and generosity, and of her time of life will be a lone, widow, working for her livelihood, appears heroic and remarkable. She was an early member of the Church, came here in 1847 and as she quietly observed helped to make the country. Her husband, Elder Hayden W. Church, was one of the Mormon Battalion, and no doubt as true-hearted and faithful a man as could be found anywhere. He went on a mission about five years ago, as said, took sick while among his friends in Tennessee, died, and was buried at the side of his father and other relatives at the old home in that State.

**The Prodigal's Return.**—On the morning of the 24th ult., a couple of young gentlemen residing in this city, left on horseback for a trip to Soda Springs, having with them a pack animal loaded with bedding, provisions, cooking utensils, etc., and taking a route up through City Creek Canyon, down Hard Scramble Gulch, and via Morgan County toward their destination. Why they chose Celebration Day for their departure is not known. Just one week ago yesterday, a couple of dusty, haggard, weary, footsore travelers might have been seen tramping down City Creek Canyon, carrying their bedding and camp outfit on their backs, enquiring of every passer by how far it was called to Salt Lake, and on being answered, pushing on with a stolid fixedness of resolution mixed with despair that was quite painful to behold. Finally they reached home, and after they had been well washed, were recognized as the two individuals who left here on Pioneer Day for a trip to Southern Idaho. Had they really accomplished the journey in 11 days? Where were their horses? Had they eaten them, or were the Yampah Utes on the war path again? Such were the questions with which they were pelted by anxious friends who gathered around to hear the story of the modern prodigals. But neither had much to say. An "accident" had occurred which prevented the completion of the journey, but that was all that could be elicited. In the meantime, the two worthies rigged out a couple of borrowed horses, and on Saturday the 7th inst., set out once more for the north. This time they were gone only till Tuesday morning, and returned with sparkling eyes and saddle horses, the latter tied to their saddles, and marched triumphantly through the streets of the city. They were again surrounded by eager enquirers and taxed with numerous questions, but all to no purpose. They would speak no further on the matter. But "murder will out" and so will a good joke. The adventure they refused to divulge is as follows: The two tourists, after leaving Salt Lake, proceeded on their way and for several days all went swimmingly. On the third or fourth night, fickle fortune cut the following caper: They had tethered their animals, securely they supposed, and betaken themselves to rest near a sheltering thicket, when just as sleep was settling on their eyelids, a loud snort from the horses awoke them with a start. They sat up in bed with hair bristling like goose quills and looked wildly around. All was dark. Suddenly a sound in the bushes attracted their attention. The horses, as thoroughly frightened as their riders, now broke loose from their fastenings and galloped away into the darkness. If our heroes were scared before, they were terrified now. They were in a new country, far distant from any houses, for aught they knew on an Indian reservation, and their horses had gone and left them. They slept no more that night, and when it was light enough to see, started out to hunt for their animals. They found the pack mule a short distance away, but the day was fruitlessly spent looking for the others. They returned to camp with saddened hearts and faces as pale as long as their mules'. Next day, off they went again, wading rivers, climbing hills, scratching through brush and vines, and trying brush, but all to no effect. Four days and nights were thus occupied, and at length the two broken-hearted hunters resolved to return to the city. This they did, tramping through the whole distance—75 miles. On returning with horses to the scene of their pedestrian exploits, they found their animals at a sheep ranch, shortly, and will constitute a companion work to Xenophon's Anabasis.

**A Drunken Postmaster.**—The thriving little town of Ephraim, Sanpete County, is cursed with a nuisance in the shape of a drunken and profane postmaster, who, it is said, takes delight in insulting peaceable citizens who apply for their mail, abusing them without provocation, and carousing around at night and on the Sabbath, and breaking the peace in various ways. A correspondent to the *Enquirer*, from that place, writes as follows, under date of the 7th inst.: "The people of our usually quiet town were somewhat disturbed on Sunday morning last. Some of our citizens went to the postoffice at the usual hour of delivery, but instead of receiving it they had a stream of profane and abusive language given them. Many who were anxious to get their papers for Sunday reading were compelled to go away without tickets, and refuse to buy if they do not read over this item.
