**LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.**  
**Postmaster Appointed.**—Cornelius Traveler has been appointed postmaster at Richmond, Cache County.  
**Fined for Stealing.**—Two small boys, named Nattrass and Wright, respectively, were fined \$20 each on Saturday for stealing. When discovered by the police, under some circumstances they had a whole cargo of stolen articles stowed away, and were readily adding to their stock, day after day.  
**School Opening.**—The 14th District school, as will be seen from a notice elsewhere, will re-open on Monday morning, the 23rd inst., with Miss J. Taylor, principal, and Miss Rose Taylor assistant. The school will be re-supplied with educational furniture and appliances, and the grounds are to be improved.  
**No "Sunny South" Tonight.**—The performance which was postponed until this evening, on account of the non-arrival of the Johnson and Cooper combination last week, will take place tonight, as the troupe have still failed to put in an appearance. It is understood that they are detained at Eureka, Nevada, and that their leading lady has had a severe attack of illness.  
**The Piercy Combination.**—The Piercy Dramatic Combination, spoken of last week, will probably make their first appearance here on Monday evening, August 30th. Mr. Y. C. Piercy, the advance agent is already in town, making the necessary arrangements. The troupe, it will be remembered, is an exceedingly strong and talented one, and all their pieces but one are entirely new to the Salt Lake stage. This exception is Shakespeare's "Much Ado About Nothing," which was so popular here at the time of Julia Dean's engagement. The strong card of this company is "Deception," in which they will open. They will also play "Diplomacy," "Clancourt," and other pieces, and will probably give six performances.  
**School Matters in the South.**—Dr. John R. Park and Professor M. H. Hardy, who have been on a trip through Southern Utah on educational business, arrived in Salt Lake Saturday evening, having made the tour of the south since the 21st of June, the day they left Provo, and began their labors in Utah County. They first visited the settlements on the east side of Utah Lake, and arriving at the southern boundary of the county, struck off to make the tour of the whole western part of the Territory to St. George. This they did, touching at all the principal points along the line. From St. George and vicinity, their route was southeast to Kanab, and from there across to Long Valley. They traversed the valley, visiting on the way Mt. Carmel, Orderville and Glendale. They then left for the Rio Virgen and followed the river up to its source, also striking the source of the Sevier, both streams rising in the same region and flowing in opposite directions. They followed down the Sevier, visiting all the settlements in the West Fork down to Kingston. Thence the East Fork was traversed as far as Otter Creek, Otter Creek as far as Grass Valley, when the party returned to the Sevier at Glenwood. Every settlement in the Sevier County was visited. They next went on to Sanpete, calling at every settlement but Fayette, and returned to Utah county through Thistle Valley. Striking Goshen they proceeded around the west and north sides of Utah Lake, and arrived in Provo on Friday the 13th. They were gone 56 days, traveled 1,379 miles, and visited upwards of 90 school districts. They held no public meetings, but are confident of having accomplished more good than they had done now. Their plan on reaching a settlement was to call on the President, Bishop or presiding officer and state the object of their visit. (They were provided with letters and credentials from the Territorial Superintendent of District Schools, and made the tour expressly in the interest of these schools.) The superintendents, trustees and other school officers would then be called together and a business meeting of three or four hours duration would be held, during which the latter would be closely catechized as to their understanding of the school law, theory of teaching, systems of training, and instructed on these points as well as on the best methods of keeping books, selecting teachers, building school houses and furnishing them, etc. In this way they had an opportunity of going right to the bottom of matters, and imparting good and wholesome instruction wherever it was needed in respect to the details of school government. They would hold several meetings in a day, did not stay two consecutive nights in the same place, and after being up many times until eleven o'clock at a meeting, got off early next morning to another settlement. The above plan was considered more beneficial, as had they held public meetings they would have been forced to waste much time, since such meetings could only be held in the evening, after the men had been working hard all day in the harvest field, and then only the general principles of education could have been lectured upon. Had they pursued this course, the journey could not have been accomplished in the time at the disposal of the missionaries. They did time was not only saved, but much more good accomplished than would otherwise have been done. Dr. Park speaks favorably of all places visited, but mentions the schools of St. George, Washington, Kanab and those of Sanpete State as among the best south of Utah. At Washington, a free school has been established, with one percent having been levied for its support. Both the gentlemen have worked hard, and no doubt have done much good. They return looking well for themselves, and deserve much credit for their labors.

**Sunday Services.**—The usual Sabbath services of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, were held in the Tabernacle yesterday afternoon, commencing at 2 o'clock.  
**Elder ORSON PRATT,** occupied the time in an interesting discourse on the New Jerusalem and the Old Jerusalem, two glorious cities to be built upon the earth in the last days. He read from the Book of Mormon (Chapter 8th of Ether), concerning these cities and compared the sayings therein with the description to be found in the 21st chapter of Revelations. There were many opinions as to the true meaning of this portion of the Apocalypse, and various interpretations had been made of it, by various persons. The Latter-day Saints, had no interpretation but the literal fulfillment of the prophecy. They believed it meant exactly what it said, and would certainly come to pass. At the time John saw these two cities descending out of heaven from God, he said he beheld a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away. These remarks were also subject to divers interpretations. The Saints believed this really meant the literal passing away of the heaven and earth we now behold, in fulfillment of the scripture which said that the elements should melt with fervent heat and that heaven should depart as a scroll, and they also believed it that a new earth would actually be created out of the materials that composed the one on which we dwell, which would be cleansed and purified by fire for that purpose. This new earth, although composed of those materials, would be vastly different to the other. One of the great distinguishing features was the absence of the great waste of waters, now occupying the larger portion of the globe. This was according to John, the Revelator, who said "there was no more sea." There might be rivers, for he saw a pure river of water of life, clear as crystal, proceeding out of the throne of God and of the Lamb," etc. This new earth would be constructed in the most perfect manner possible. All curses would be removed and pain and death would be done away. A race of people free from all these troubles would be a comparative anomaly, considering the present condition of the people of this world. But who were these inhabitants to be? Were they a new race of beings, created especially for this new earth spoken of, or had we any reason to suppose they were the same people who were now on this earth, purified and regenerated even as their earth had been and restored to inherit it forever? This latter was the view the Saints took of it. Those who were to inhabit this resurrected world were those whose names were written in the Lamb's Book of Life, who would be resurrected before the great mass of earth's present inhabitants, and come down to the new earth out of heaven from God, in the two beautiful cities spoken of before. But what of the origin of these cities? To learn this we take us back over a thousand years. Ezekiel prophesied the erection of a city in the last days on the site of the Jerusalem that was destroyed by the Babylonian armies. The next name of this city was to signify "The Lord our Righteousness." Jeremiah also declared that the Israelites should return to their lands and should "know the Lord from the least unto the greatest," and that their city should be built and no more be plucked up nor thrown down forever. This was one of the cities described by John, as descending out of heaven from God. But how was this to be done, and how could it help being "plucked up or thrown down" at the time the heaven and the earth passed away. This question was quite natural. This city would continue on the earth where it was built, during the Millennium, and the Lord would come to it. But previous to the destruction of the earth it would be caught up and preserved in the heavens until after the world was destroyed and recreated, when it would descend from the skies as John saw it, and rest upon the earth for ever. This was the second city that John saw come down from heaven. What of the first? For the account of its origin, we were dependent upon modern revelation. From the Book of Mormon (Ether) we learned that this other city, which is named in Revelations as the New Jerusalem, was to be built upon the American continent. Ether also told of the inhabitants of this city, as well as those of the Old Jerusalem. The latter was to be rebuilt and peopled by the ten tribes of Israel and the Jews, while the New Jerusalem would be built and occupied by the seed of Joseph. This branch of the house of Israel included the American Indians of both continents, who would be assisted from the east by the seed of Joseph, the blood of Joseph who would be gathered out from among the Gentiles. Upon what spot was this city to be built? It would be erected on the land of Zion in the west, on a boundary now called Missouri. It would be equally beautiful with the old Jerusalem, described so magnificently in the 21st Chapter of Revelations. It would be erected by a people much persecuted, as told by Isaiah in the prophecy beginning with the words, "O thou afflicted and tossed with tempest," etc., and as would be seen from the contents of the Book of Mormon, the children would be taught of the Lord, and they, as well as the people of the Lord in Palestine, would know the Lord for themselves.  
**The Doctrine and Covenants** contained a revelation to be sung at a certain time in the history of this New Jerusalem or Zion. That song contained these words: "Thou hast brought again Zion, thou hast brought down Zion from above." What did this mean? We were told in Scripture that in ancient days a righteous man named Enoch built a city, which on account of its holiness was translated with all its inhabitants. Modern revelation explained that this city would return to the earth and form the part of the great city of Zion on this continent. It was the descent of the city of Enoch, and the ascent of the other, that was set forth in that song, to be sung when the two cities came to the earth. The Zion of this continent would consist of a combination of two cities. Previous to this, however, the city, like its mate in Palestine, would be a separate entity on the earth, when it would be caught up to meet Enoch's City, and preserved until the regeneration of the earth, and then descend to take its place upon the earth for all eternity. The whole world would be filled with the glory of God, but these great cities would be the headquarters of Jesus Christ, the King, and there would be a temple in each of them and the throne of God in each temple. Adam and Enoch and others would not doubt have their home on this continent, where they formerly resided, and where the patriarchs and others of the Israelitish patriarchs would dwell in Palestine. All would have the privilege of coming to the city, and the two continents would be joined, as they were before the days of Peleg, and new means of travelling would be discovered, now entirely unknown, and the people would move with any velocity. The speaker dwelt upon many other interesting particulars concerning the two great cities, and the glory of a state, but our limited space compels us to omit mentioning them.
