President Causes Arrest of Hundred and Sixty Citizens of Guatemala.

ALL THROWN INTO PRISON.

Entire Diplomatic Corps, With Exception of the American Charge, Entered a Protest.

Mexico City, July 1 .-- Word reached Mexico City tonight that President Cabrera of Guatemala had caused the arrest of 160 citizens of that republic on the charge of alleged complicity in the recent attempt to assassinate him. All were thrown into prison and later herded into squads of 20 and tried in groups. Two bands have been tried groups. Two bands have been tried and many of the accused sentenced to death. Among the men imprisoned are some most wealthy and prominent men in the country. The statem in is made that these men have long been on Ca-brera's blacklist, and the charges against them were trumped up for pe-litical reasons. The report has created excitement among Central American residents in this city, and at a mass meeting to be held Sunday the matter will be discussed. Troops are being hurriedly rushed to the Mexi-can frontier and the Honduran borders and San Salvador. Special trains of artillery are being sent out tonight to the frontier. The legations are being besieged by relatives and friends of the imprisoned men who fear that they will be unceremoniously put to death.

NO DISCRIMINATION.

Father Arrested on Suspicion and Then Released.

New York, July 1.—A sensational turn was given today to the case of Viola Boylan, the 9-year-old girl who was found maitreated and murdered in the cellar of her parents' home, when the girl's father. Thomas Boy-lan, was arjested. After a searching of Boylan's apartments he was taken into custody and at first charged with being a suspicious person. He was questioned closely about the disap-pearance of the child. Boylan is 60 years old and a cripple, the arrest was unsuspected, as the police had been searching for some unknown Italian, who was said by Viola's playmates to have intercepted the girl upon the street and to have taken her into a wine cellar. After questioning Boylan the police hanged the charge against him to homicide.
