County Attorney Willard Hanson's Address to the Jury Yesterday Afternoon.

MCWHIRTER FAINTS IN COURT

Staggers to Door and Collapses in Hallway While Judge Thurman Thunders Against the Two Scotchmen.

County Attorney Hanson's address to the jury in the Sheets case yesterday was voted by his friends as one of the ablest arguments of his career and a crowded courtroom followed him word by word. From a prosecutor's view-point he traced the McWhirter affair from the time the boys met Lary O'Brien until the last bit of evidence in the case just ended was in. He began at 2 o'clock and in an hour had concluded. During that time a host of telling points had been made and the impression made upon his auditors, aside from the jurymen, was shown by nods and significant shakings of the head.

Mr. Hanson was followed by Judge S. R. Thurman, during whose merciless arraignment of the state, its case and witnesses, Alexander McWhirter fainted. Mr. McWhirter, who was the victim of the hokey-pokey game and attendant robbery was sitting with other auditors on a long bench just to the rear of the press table. While Judge Thurman was thundering against the "two Scotchmen who wouldn't and couldn't be fair." Mr. McWhirter arose to his feet, with face deathly white. He staggered to the door, and upon reaching the hall outside collapsed. Needless to say, this created a mild sensation to say the lenst.

Attorney Soren X. Christensen followed Judge Thurman, and was the speaker this morning for the defense, Aity. Wedgwood will not talk, so Atty. Christensen will be followed by District Attorney Loofbourow, who closes the state's argument. This will cover the forenoon and half the afternoon. The court will then read its charge to the jury, and that body will retire to agree upon a verdict.

Atty. Hanson began in a low voice. 




### MAYOR TAKES HAND.

He Suggests New Plan for Handling Poll Tax Collections.

A new method of handling poll tax collections has been suggested by Mayor Bransford, a plan that will put an end to the haphazard manner in which that phase of the city's finances have heretofore been carried on. In the past most anybody in the street department could issue a poll tax receipt, but it was not always certain that money had been paid or labor performed by the one re-ceiving it, neither was it sure that cash paid was duly accounted for. A white receipt will be used for cash pell tax and a blue one for labor. Only one man in each municipal ward will be authorized to collect cash, and he will be held responsible to the amount f \$3 for each paper that goes out of is possession.

The poll tax books stolen from the of-

ice of the department during the night of Feb. 14, have not yet been found, although Supt. Raleigh has announced that the latchstring would be left hanging on the outside to enable the guilty party to return the documents, with-

party to return the documents, without fear of apprehension.

In checking up the poil tax accounts, a surplus of \$157 has been found. It is believed that this amount is an excess paid by T. S. I. Atkins, the deposed chief clerk in the office. Atkins was accused of being \$351 short in his accounts, and that amount was refunded by him to the city. It may develop that he is entitled to the \$157 which cannot be properly accounted for.

Upon receiving the letter, which is malled in an envelope bearing the imprint of a well known concern in some other state, he opens it in the presence of the manager or clerk of the hotel and pulls out a check, at the same time showing him the letter purporting to be from the firm mentioned on the envelope, and states that the enclosed check is for expenses. He pleads lack of funds and appears to have no difficulty in securing cash on the check. Before the check is returned, protested, the man has made good his escape.

"The aliases used in cases already reported are R. W. Harris, Fred Pincus and A. E. Leonard, and each of the men is accompanied by a woman, whom he claims is his wife.




