

COMPLAINT IN INTERVENTION.

Rodney C. Badger Asks Leave to Interplead in Election Contest Case.

MAKES STATEMENT OF GROUNDS

Says He Was Deprived of Seventy-Two Votes Which Rightfully Belonged to Him.

Rodney C. Badger, this morning, by his attorney, asked leave to interplead in the election contest case, instituted by George D. Dean against George E. Burbridge, Democratic councilman-elect from the Second precinct, and Lorin J. Wood, Mr. Badger, who was on the ticket with Mr. Burbridge, submitted a statement of his grounds of defense, and a complaint in intervention. Whether or not he will be allowed to interplead in the case will be decided by the court this afternoon.

that errors were made in counting the votes in the several districts in the precinct whereby Badger was deprived of 72 votes which rightfully belonged to him. It was also alleged that, through errors, Wood received 36 votes more than he was entitled to and Dean received 36 votes more than he was entitled to in the precinct. The alleged disqualification of Dean by reason of his employment by the Rio Grande Western Railway company, which holds valuable franchises from the city, is also set out in Mr. Badger's statement. The amended complaint in the original action, making L. J. Wood a party defendant was also filed today by plaintiff's attorney. The attorney for Mr. Wood also filed a demurrer to the amended complaint and a motion to strike from the files the statement of grounds of defense of Mr. Badger. Owing to the fact that another case was occupying Judge Lewis' attention this morning the hearing of the contest case was continued until this afternoon, and will be taken up at the conclusion of the case which was on trial this morning.

STREET CAR CO. SUE.

Eliza Brown Sues to Recover Damages For Alleged Carelessness.

Eliza Brown filed suit in the district court today against the Consolidated Railway and Power company to recover \$1,500 damages for personal injuries received on May 19, 1903, by being thrown from a car at the corner of Second South and West Temple streets. It is alleged that she was attempting to alight from the car when it was started with a sudden jerk which threw her to the pavement, rendering her unconscious and injuring her arm, head and hips so that she is unable to attend to her regular work.

LEO WILLIS ON TRIAL.

Man Charged With Stealing Electrical Instrument Before Criminal Court.

The trial of the case of the state vs. J. Leo Willis, charged with grand larceny, was commenced before a jury in Judge Morse's court this morning. Willis is charged with stealing a volt meter and ammeter from the University of Utah. The jurors sworn to try the case are T. H. Pierce, H. N. Bird, Martin Mahken, G. T. Bess, J. S. Lindway, J. A. Phillips, T. O. Angell and W. M. Walker. The trial will be concluded today.

CARL WARR DISCHARGED.

It is Claimed Parents Did Not Want Him Around the House.

Carl Warr, who several days ago was released from the county jail and who then went to his home in Sugar House and created a disturbance, was tried before Justice Rockwood, at Sugar, yesterday, on the charge of disturbing the peace and was discharged. The charge was lodged against Warr by his parents. The evidence at the trial went to show that the members of the family were afraid of the boy and did not want him around the place, so when he returned from jail they tried to make him leave home and he refused to go. The sheriff's office was notified that he was creating a disturbance, so two deputies went after him and lodged him in jail.

The county commissioners have confirmed the appointment, submitted by Sheriff Emery of L. W. Clark as a special deputy sheriff, to act without pay from the county, at the Granite state fair during the next two weeks.

The board appointed John R. Mackay of Grand County as a delegate from this county to the National Livestock convention at Portland.

The sum of \$2,500 has been appropriated by the board for the contingent expenses of the office of the county superintendent of schools.

SHEEP INSPECTORS PAID.

The first payment of salaries of deputy sheep inspectors under the new sheep inspection law was made today by State Auditor Tingey, when the aggregate sum of about \$5,000 was paid out for salaries from April up to date. There are about 20 deputies, and they receive \$5 per day and expenses for time actually put in. The total amount

of taxes for this year under the new law at the rate of four mills will be \$14,000. The warrants paid out today exhaust the fund which has been collected up to date.

Democratic Senators Confer.

Washington, Dec. 11.—The Democratic senators continued their conference with the view to reaching a course to be pursued on Cuban legislation. They decided that the caucus action that the Democratic senators should vote together on party questions in the future should not be binding on the vote upon the Cuban reciprocity bill, but that each senator should vote as he might prefer on that measure. The conference also agreed to postpone its decision as to the course to be pursued with reference to the Panama canal treaty and decision to hold meetings for the consideration of that and other questions as they may come up for consideration.

KILLED IN A COLLISION.

Two Men Dead, Two Fatally Hurt, Others Badly Injured.

Fort Scott, Kan., Dec. 16.—Two men lost their lives, two were fatally hurt and several others were more or less severely injured in a collision of two sections of a freight train on a long bridge on the "Frisco" system south of Pawnee, Kan., 15 miles from Fort Scott, early today. The rear section ran into the forward section, P. M. Hermitage, of Montett, Mo., a brakeman, who was riding on the engine of the rear train was phoned between the cab and tender and burned to death.
