BROKERS GO TO ELK'S SHOW

An Arizona Newspaper Man Visits  
Nevada Mining Regions.

DISTRICTS TO BE OPENED

Was Favorably Impressed With Good  
Springs—Decides It to be a Very  
Favorable Section.

M. M. Rice, a well known Arizona  
newspaper man recently made a tour of  
southern Nevada, visiting the mining  
districts to be penetrated by the San  
Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake rail-  
road between Caliente and Daggett.

Mr. Rice continued his journey to  
Tonopah and made the following con-  
tribution to the Bonanza:

"Ever since the discovery of Pioche  
and El Dorado canyon prospectors have  
periodically penetrated the almost un-  
approachable section lying south of  
Austin and Eureka and east of the  
Panamint range to the borders of Arizona  
and Utah. Many mining properties  
have been discovered, located and worked  
in a desultory manner in the  
past few years by the poor owners, but  
owing to the inaccessibility to market  
and lack of transportation facilities, little  
has been accomplished in attracting the  
attention of capital to a section of  
country larger than the New England  
states and containing mineralized zones  
of every conceivable class and charac-  
ter."

For years past Senator W. A. Clark  
of Montana has had his agents through  
this section of the west and with a  
thorough knowledge of the resources  
and conditions of the desert has determined  
that its undeveloped riches shall no  
longer remain dormant. His faith is  
exemplified by his acquisition of the  
best property on the route and by the  
amount of money invested in his rail-  
road enterprise.

To those unacquainted with the coun-  
try through which the Clark road  
passes, it might be of interest to state  
that from Caliente south to Daggett, a  
distance of some 300 miles, camp will  
be opened up containing vast deposits  
of gold, silver, copper, lead, zinc, tin,  
manganese, molybdenum, antimony and  
quartzite, salt, borax, nitre and gypsum.

Taking the line south of Caliente  
the road traverses the Meadow Valley  
wash to Manzanar, on the east of this  
valley lies the "Mormon" range, where  
many fine undeveloped gold properties  
exist on the west is the Meadow Val-  
ley range, as yet but partially explored,  
but known to contain large accumula-  
tions of low grade silver ore.

From Muspa to Las Vegas the road  
crosses an undulating mesa country,  
bounded east and west by the Muddy and  
Vegas ranges containing inex-  
haustable deposits of rock salt and  
gypsum. From Las Vegas to the state  
line at Dry lake the road passes be-  
tween the El Dorado range and the Potosi  
mountains.

The El Dorado canyon range is one of  
the richest gold belts on the American  
continent. The ledges are large and  
carry values that in a more accessible  
country would add materially to the  
importance of the nation. From Stone's  
Ferry on the Colorado to Fort Mohave  
the range is a network of gold bearing  
ledges, and while capital has interested  
itself in the results here, the Chinese  
Sandschild district is proof of this.

One of the most favorable sections in  
the state is that part of Lincoln and  
Nye counties which includes Good  
Spring, Yellow Pine, Timber Mountain  
and Montgomery districts. At Good  
Spring is located the Campbell group of  
silver mines. While they were situated  
in Colorado, Utah or Arizona they would  
have great reduction works employing  
thousands of men and supporting a  
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When the Good Spring is a gold belt  
containing many promising mines; the  
Keystone is the only property developed  
to any great extent. Here is a mill and  
cyanide plant, turning out large  
monthly output of gold bullion.

North of Keystone is the old Potosi  
mine, worked in the old days, but  
of late years idle. There are a number of  
very fine copper-silver-lead mines in  
this vicinity, and an abundance of wa-  
ter and fuel for working purposes.

Montgomery district, in the southeast  
corner of Nye county, is rich in the  
quantity and quality of its gold ores.  
All of these canons are tributary to the  
Clark railroad and vary in distance from  
the main line from six to thirty miles.

Passing into the state of California at  
Dry lake the road opens up equally as  
good a mining country in San Bernar-  
dino county. Ivanah has produced  
in the last few years the highest  
percentage of silver ever extracted from  
the earth, and it has been only partially developed.  
The Copper World mine has produced  
the two years' operation of a little  
gold smelter. Vanderbilt is a rich gold  
belt; Crescent has the richest deposit of  
turquoise on the continent, and these  
gems are also found in paying quantities  
in the Colorado Mountain range, 20 miles  
north of the state line.

New York district, 12 miles south, and  
Provident mountain contains rich veins  
and along the line to old Camp Creek,  
in the sink of the Mojave river, all  
valleys containing nitre and borax and  
hills containing gold, silver and copper.

ONTARIO'S NEW MILL.

Management Has Decided on a Plant  
Of 125 Tons Daily Capacity.

The management of the Ontario mine  
at Ontario, Calif., has concluded to  
construct the proposed concentrator with a  
capacity of 125 tons daily.
