Horrible Accident in the Daly Mine at Park City.

## JAMES O'CONNELL ANOTHER DEATH.

Real Estate Exchange.—Brick Works—Indian Creek Items—Tarns—our Batteries.

James O'Connell, a miner, was killed in shaft No. 1 of the Daly mine at Park City, shortly before 6 o'clock last evening. He was on the 800 foot level, and attempted to climb from the lower to the upper deck of the cage, so he could get out with his tools. He got up to the 1000 foot level, and there, just as he got his hand and shoulder above the floor of the upper deck the cage started, and O'Connell was caught between the floor of the cage and the top of the station. The men in the cage saw him, but did nothing to save him. His shoulders were severed, and the hand also severed and torn off. The cage encircled the "mangled body, which fell to the bottom of the shaft, one foot below." The awful accident was reported immediately to the head of the mine, and the body was hurriedly mutilated down to the last, the arms and legs being broken in a number of pieces. The remains were carefully placed in a coffin and taken to the undertaker's, where an angel was again born.

O'Connell leaves a wife and eight children, two of whom are married. He had lived at the Park for about seven years, and at first had not even been employed at the mine. He was 49 years of age. He was a steady regular worker and was well received.

How the cage came to start at the particular instant that O'Connell was fastened to it is not understood. It was fast at "expansion," the highest, and it may be he had a signal of fast, and his statement in this regard is indubious except. None of the men remembers giving the signal, but it is not unlikely that some one did, probably the engineer, and urged that he had done so. In the excitement of the moment, no blame is attached to any one.
