It is asserted therein that Austria covertly assisted by Austria Germany intends to prevent the settlement. It is stated that England's isolation endangers the three empires to settle the Balkan question as they see. The Bulgarian troubles are connected with this idea. It is now certain that Alexander's lowly estate is virtually a transfer of power to Russian dictation.

The following is Louis J. Jennings' letter to the World: London, 15.—When Richard Cobden was appointed plenipotentiary to negotiate the treaty of commerce with France, in 1860, it was prophesied by English statesmen, and particularly by those who had fought with Cobden and Bright in the struggle against the corn laws that a free trade millennium was at hand. Twenty years have passed and France not only remains unconvinced, but cleaves to her idol with a stubbornness that almost makes Manchester despair. The proposed alteration in the French tariff have created something like consternation in the commercial and manufacturing centres. The new system, if put into operation, will have the effect of shutting out many of the most important descriptions of English goods, and the trouble is that England conceded France so much in the Cobden treaty that she has nothing left for use as a lever to compel the republic to treat her manufactures with some degree of consideration.

Just now times are terribly dull in northern towns. Americans who have travelled through Yorkshire and Lancashire will remember that the Lancashire and Yorkshire and Midland railroads traverse a perfect hive of industry, but the hum for some time past has been ominously faint. At Leeds the woolen trade is suffering grievously and Bradford is even in a worse plight. The iron trade is also affected, the Belgian and German forges being formidable competitors, and at Nottingham, Birmingham, Coventry, and other places further south the stagnation is very marked. You can well understand, therefore, that the new French duties are regarded with alarm, more especially as English exports to the United States show a steady falling off in consequence of your prohibitory tariff. It has become clear to politicians of both parties, the extreme doctrinaires of course excepted, that unless something is done and done quickly, English trade will be seriously if not permanently injured. The advocates of a retaliatory policy of "reciprocity of tariffs," as it has been aptly defined, are making great headway among the manufacturers and artisans, and I know as a matter of fact that influential politicians who not many years ago would have scoffed at the idea of returning to the system of protection, are now talking of clapping a duty of 25 per cent. on French wines, and one of 50 per cent. on French silks.
