BEET GROWERS MAKE DEMANDS

Prominent Planters Meet in Ogden and Decide on Getting More for Their Beets.

BURGLARS ROB MARKS' HOME.

Hugh W. Dougall and Miss Kelly Will Give Concert in Congregational Church-News Briefs.

Ogden, Feb. 12.-It appears that a majority of the sugar beet raisers of Weber, Davis and Boxelder counties, who furnish sugar beets to the Amalgamated Sugar company's Ogden factory, are not satisfied with the price they have been receiving for their beets up to the present time. A meeting for the consideration of this matter was held Saturday afternoon, commencing at 2 o'clock which was attended by a delegation of about 50 of the largest beet raisers of this district, who discussed at length the proposition and decided that unless the management of the factory will grant them an increase of 25 cents per ton on all sugar beets they will not plant any this year, but will raise other crops which they believe will be more profitable. The sugar company has be a paying a flat rate of 44.50 per ton for beets in the ast, but the request of the farmers will be that they be paid a rate of \$4.50 per ton for beets delivered on cars or \$4.75 per ton for beets delivered at the sugar factory. A committee composed of James Beus, Hooper, Nathaniel Montgomery, North Ogden, Lyman Sheen, Plain City, James Ogden, Lyman Sheen, Flain City, James Hutchins, Slaterville, and Peter Rowe of Boxelder county, was appointed to call on David Eccles to present to him the request of the farmers for a raise price of beets.

on the price of beets.

Last year was a very hard year for the beet raisers of this district, because of the pest known as the white fly, and the shortage of water, which in some places almost caused a total fall-ure of the crop. These unfortunate conditions may not occur again for many but it had a tendency to discour years, but it had a tendency to discour-age the beet growers and therefore they have been slow to sign contracts for this year, fearing such losses again, and the company's field superintendent and the company's field superintendent has been meeting with little success in some localities in getting those who have heretofore raised beets to sign a contract for this year. It is believed the company will give the farmers' proposition due consideration, and that the differences now existing can be agreeably adjusted. The raising of sugar heets here here a great industry for this beets has been a great industry for this part of the state, as up until last year the farmers have had excellent success with their crops, and have as a general rule been quite satisfied, as they knew early in the year how much land they ere going to plant in sugar beets, and about what the yield would be, also the price they would be paid for the product, were sure of a market and of the cash for the beets when the crop was harvested. The committee will likely meet the manage ment of the sugar company the early part of this week to discuss the propo-

BEET MOLASSES FACTORY.

Much Interest Taken in Proposition-Two Couples Wed-News Briefs.

Special Correspondence. Provo, Utah Co., Feb. 12.—The meeting of farmers, held Saturday, in response to a public invitation from Mr. Havercamp to meet and consider the matter of raising beets for the new molasses factory, which he proposes to establish, showed considerable interest in the undertaking.

The project was explained by Mr.

Havercamp and Freeman Tanner of Payson, and a number of the farmers signified their willingness to raise beets signified their willingness to raise heets for the new industry. Another meeting will be held when further details are worked out, and contracts will be entered into, and there seems to be no reason to doubt that a successful run will be made this season. Mr. Havercamp has enlisted the support of the Utah Sugar company to the extent that Utah Sugar company to the extent that the company will furnish the seed, the company will furnish the seed, which is an important and necessary consideration. It develops that the man entitled to a great deal of the credit for the success that has been made is Mr. Tanner. He has worked for several years, experimenting with crude machinery, on the manufacture of beet molasses, and the success is the more remarkable when it is known that he has no knowledge of chemistry, while many chemists who have tried to eliminate t the rank flavor and odor from failed. beet molasses failed. When Mr. Havercamp became interested with Mr. Tanner more scientific methods were adopted, and noticeable improvements in the product followed. The calculations as to cost of production have been based in the work done by rude machienry in a small way in which it has been im-possible to extract all the sugar from the beets, and with the improved beets, and with the improved methods it is proposed to adopt the cost will be less and the production greater, and it also seems probable, the quality will be yet further improved. The ap-

plication for patent for the process has been made and there is every reason to believe the venture will prove very profitable to the owners of the patent and beneficial to the country at large.

In His Speech at Labor Hall He Advocates Industrial

Republic.

HIS THEME WAS UNIONISM.

Says Struggle to Better Conditions Has Been a Long and Bloody One-Political Action Needed.

W. S. Dalton, in a speech at the Federation of Labor hall last evening, advocated the creation of an industrial republic, and the crushing of capital-"The Right and Wrong of Unionism"

was Mr. Dalton's theme. He said in part: "The history of labor unionism is the record of the struggle of the work-

ing class to better their condition. This struggle has been not only a desperate, but a blind and bloody one, Carried on in the beginning by the skilled trades, with no thought for the betterment of their unskilled brothers, its main object at times appeared to be to build up a monopoly for a few mechanics and to bar out all others. But the development of the labor-saving machines tends more and more for strike the armor of skill form the ing machines tends more and more to strike the armor of skill from the breast of the mechanic and to place him on a level with all other workers, so we find the union extending its scope and taking under its banner vast numbers of workers who had no place in the old guild system of craft unionism. In this, as well as in other things, the machine has proven itself the great social revolutionist. Those who obey its orders and adapt themselves to the changes it institutes will selves to the changes it institutes will survive; those who oppose it, be they labor unions or nations, will crushed and destroyed.

LONG BLOODY STRUGGLE.

"As unionism grew and extended, so also did its aims and objects enlarge and change. Craft unionism fought for a few dollars more and a few hours jess, it accepted the wage sys-tem, that is, the buying and selling of tem, that is, the buying and selling of tabor power, as a finality. It had no higher vision of the working class than that of a permanent merchandise, which sold itself in the modern slave auction called the 'labor market,' and got the the best terms tossible. Its weapons were as futile and foolish as its ideal was degraded. The strike means pitting. means pitting empty stomachs and slim purses against full stomachs and millions. Not only did the unorgan-ized workers scab on the strikers, but the rest of the unions promptly turned their members into 'scabs' by continuing at work producing and carrying material, helping strike breakers, militia and police to shoot the strikers into submission and in general aiding the employers to crush the strikers.

ers. "Those unions that depend today on the old-fashioned strike and refuse to learn the lesson taught by the machine, are as surely doomed to extinction as the savage tribe in the face of

an oncoming civilized race.
"The battle for the universal union shop, miscalled the 'closed shop,' can never be won by the tactics of the old craft unionism; industrial unionism alone is capable of winning such victory. Every victory for the eight-hour

day has been won by disregarding the advice of the fakir leaders to keep out of politics, "Industrial unionism regards the so-

called 'strike' as criminal nonsense or worse. It teaches that it is almost as feelish for the single union to pit its slim resources against the employer as it is for the individual workman to go out alone on strike. This does not ean that the Industrial Workers of the World will not resist the masters of the bread, but we shall choose the battleground and select the weapons, guided by our experience in the class war and our knowledge of the power we possess as citizens.

We plainly proclaim our ultimate object to be 'to take and hold that which we produce by our labor.' We mean by this that when the voters in the exercise of their political rights shall decree that the machinery of production must be restored to the people the Industrial Workers of the World will back up that decree in the mill, mine, shop and railroad and crush any attempt at treason on the part of the usurping capitalist class by locking out the dividend drawers and making the industries of the Unified States a 'closed shop' against parasites and exploiters.
