His Hotel and Subsistence Concession on the Panama Canal Zone Will Stand.

PRESIDENT HAS SO DECIDED.

Protest of Hudgins & Dumas and H. Balfe Not Sustained-Contract

Is Worth Millions.

Oyster Bay, Sept. 14 - A contract for the hotel and subsistence concession on the Panama canal zone, awarded to Jacob E. Markel of Omaha by President Theodore P. Shonts of the Panama Railroad company, will stand. This, in effect, is the decision of President Roosevelt, who today approved a report on the subject made him by Mr. Shonts.

The contract amounts, in the aggre gate, to many millions of dollars, but Mr. Shonts' report indicates that it may be abrogated at the will of the government, which actually will own the permanent plant used by Mr. Markel In filling the terms of his couract. The president today authorized the publication of a report he had receiv ed from Mr. Shonta, as president of the
