

DEMOCRATS WILL COMPLETE TICKET

City Committee Meets Tonight to Fill Vacancies for City Offices.

FUSION IN ALL THE WARDS

Councilmanic Ticket to be Arranged At Meetings to be Held This Evening.

The Democratic city committee met at 8 o'clock tonight in the law office of Moyle & Van Cott to complete its ticket. A treasurer and a recorder are to be named to fill the vacancies caused by the withdrawal of A. N. McKay as recorder and Byron Gross as treasurer. It is understood that the candidates named will be favorable to the Citizens' movement and that they will be endorsed by that organization. As the ticket now stands, William R. Wallace is the nominee for mayor. Thomas Marionaux for city attorney and William J. Bateman for auditor.

Mr. Wallace has already been endorsed by the Citizens' organization and when Mr. Bateman declined to run he was prevailed upon by both the Democrats and Citizens to remain on the ticket. He finally decided to accept the nomination, and it is understood that his resignation will be withdrawn.

Frank W. Sprague, mining editor of the Herald-Republican, has been spoken of favorably as the candidate for recorder on the ticket. He is backed by the Democrats as well as the Citizens and his name, it is said, will be present to the committee tonight for consideration.

So far no candidates have been spoken of for the treasurer. The city committee will probably submit the candidates named to a nominating committee to discuss the matter and arrive at some conclusion with the Citizens.

There will undoubtedly be fusion in the wards on the councilmanic ticket. The city committee has delegated the power to the ward organizations to arrange for that part of the ticket. After the general ticket is named the various wards will get together and decide upon the candidates.

The Republican city committee met last night and made arrangements to begin a campaign. The details were discussed and decided upon.

The ward committee in the Fourth precinct will meet tonight to name a successor on the councilmanic ticket to the one who has resigned. The resignation of the Rev. F. B. Stierl. The Fifth ward committee will meet tonight to name two candidates for the council, the Rev. Elmer L. Goshen having resigned last Monday making the second vacancy in the ward. When these candidates are named the Republican ticket will be complete, and the dates of the ward and general rallies will be announced.
