

DEMOCRATS WILL COMPLETE TICKET

City Committee Meets Tonight to Fill Vacancies for City Offices.

FUSION IN ALL THE WARDS

Councilman Ticket to be Arranged at Meetings to be Held This Evening.

The Democratic city committee meets at 8 o'clock tonight in the law office of Moyle & Van Cott to complete its ticket.

Mr. Wallace has already been endorsed by the Citizens' organization and when Mr. Bateman declined to run he was prevailed upon by both the Democrats and Citizens to remain on the ticket.

So far no candidates have been spoken of for the treasurer. The city committee will probably submit the candidates named to a nominating committee to discuss the matter and arrive at some conclusion with the Citizens.

There will undoubtedly be fusion in the wards on the councilman ticket. The city committee has delegated the power to the ward organizations to arrange for that part of the ticket.

The ward committee in the Fourth ward will meet tonight to name a successor to name a councilman ticket to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of the Rev. F. B. Shier.

The ward committee in the Fifth ward will meet tonight to name two candidates for council, the Rev. Elmer J. Goschen having resigned last Monday making the second vacancy in the ward. When these candidates are named the Republican ticket will be complete, and the dates of the ward and general rallies will be announced.
