Washington, April 23, 1879.

Hon. John A. Logan:

Sir—On the 21st inst., you pub-

lished in the *Republican*, of this

city, a sensational and entirely

untrue article, entitled "The

quarrel between Mr. Logan and

me." You have failed to state

that I have twice addressed you a

note calling your attention to this

untrue article, and that you have

refused to answer either of them,

and that you have refused to

thereby force me to the last

alternative. I therefore demand

that you
