RAILROAD VIADUCT.

Wak on Important Structure Begins Monday Next.

Ogden, April 11.—According to the Information given out in the railroad circles yesterday afternoon, the work on the Twenty-fourth street viaduct will begin next Monday morning, at which time a large force of men will be put to work upon the big job which

touth of its present location. As soon as this is done the work of excavating for the foundation will be in order and by gradual steps the structure will be rected. The steel girders to be used will rest on foundations of reinforced concrete. When finished the viaduct, which will cost several hundred thousand dol-lars, will eliminate one of the greatest iauses for complaint between the peo-ple and the railroad company that ex-ists in Ogden. Its location is at one of the busiest points in the Harriman of its present location. As soon

yards, being at the crossing of the tracks in the Union depot and the freight yards and necessarily making delays to teams and pedestrians living in the western part of the city and county. Assistant Engineer Campbell, who will have charge of the construction work stated yesterday that while he had received no definite information regarding the time the work would start, it would commence some time next week, and most likely on Mon-day. He also stated that the force of men that would be put to work at this time would not be large but would be increased as fast as the work would warrant it. warrant It.

The viaduet will extend 15 feet east from the east line of Wall avenue and west to a point opposite the Ogden Packing company's plant. Upon its completion it will be dedicated to the city. The railroad people will take care of the repairs to the structural part while the city will care for the road-way. The latter has the privilege of granting a franchise to the street or any interurban railway line over it. The franchise, however, stipulates that no weight exceeding 17,000 pounds shall be hauled across the viaduct at one time.

RECLAMATION PROJECT.

The corps of civil engineers of the E. Y. university under the supervision of Prof. Jarvis, have completed the run-ning of three different lines of surveys for the construction of the canal and reservoir to bring under irrigation ξ_{500} acres of land on Provo bench. Jos-eph R. Murdock in company with Uncle Jesse Knight, has returned from an inspection of one of the proposed lines and in all probability at the next board meeting of the university the same will be accepted. The proposed reservoir is situated in the neighborhood of Kamas, Summit county, at the head of the Provo river, and will have five small and three medium lakes The corps of civil engineers of the B Provo river, and will have ive small and three medium lakes having a storage capacity sufficient to bring under cultivation \$,500 acres. The course of the water from the reservoir will be down the Provo river until a given point in Provo canyon is reach-ed, where the head of the canal will be located.

be located. The canal will convey water to put nder irrigation the magnificent gift 500 acres of land from Jesse Knight o the Brigham Young university. Op-ions have already been offered in the sums ranging from \$100 to \$125 an acre

sums ranging from \$100 to \$125 an acre that will receive a water right under the said construction. The conditional 500 acre gift as soon as water is secured will mean that the university will have 1,000 acres all through the generosity of Uncle Jesse and the Knight family.
