WEATHER REPORT.

Record at the local office of the weather bureau for the 24 hours ending at 6 a. m. today:

Barometer reading at 6 a. m., 35.52 inches. Temperature at 6 a. m., 51 degrees; maximum, 67; minimum, 38; mean, 52, which is 10 deg. above normal.

Excess of daily mean temperature since Nov. 1, 18 deg.

Deficiency of daily mean temperature since Jan. 1, 24 deg.

Deficiency in precipitation since Jan. 1, 1.61 inch.

FORECASTS TILL 6 P. M. SUN. DAY.

Local forecast for Salt Lake City and vicinity:

Increasing cloudiness tonight; Sunday, probably rain and colder.

Increasing cloudiness tonight with warmer south portion; Sunday probably rain and colder.

WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The barometer is highest over the Mississippi valley, lake region, and North Pacific states, and lowest over the Northern Plateau and Northern Rocky Mountain slope.

Precipitation occurred over portions of Washington, Oregon, and British Columbia, with largest amount at Roseburg, Oregon; 1 inch.

The temperature is warmer; 10 deg. or more over portions of Utah, Nevada, Idaho, South Dakota, and Minnesota, and colder 10 deg. or more over portions of southwestern Oregon and Louisiana, with slight changes at other points.

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Hot house lettuce is plentiful in the Salt Lake market, wholesaling at 60 cents per dozen, and 7 1/2 cents per head retail.

An elegant copper cornice is being set up at the new telephone building, and the flagstaff was put into position this morning.

The foundations of the new Y. M. C. building will be put in this fall; and if the weather is propitious, more may be accomplished.

The regents of the state university call the attention of local insurance men to the fact that bids for insurance are being asked on the university buildings.

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Fruit men say that the coming orange crop promises so well that the railroad men are arranging to haul 55,000 cars of the yellow fruit out of California this season.

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A prominent real estate dealer estimates that 700 dwellings will have been erected in Salt Lake this year, and still there are not enough. The location is in the east and southeastern parts of the town. The same dealer said 90 per cent of his sales were east of East Temple street.

Quantities of Syracuse and Moab apples are on the market, the latter appearing to be the best advantage. Idaho apples are considered no better than the Utah fruit, and not many of them are here. No Oregon apples are reported as prevailing prices do not make it any object to ship the Oregon fruit into this market.

There is a new chrysanthemum on the local floral market called the Lady Capulet, that is of a rich shade of red than usual. It was grown by chance, and "made a hit at once." California violets are in the market at 40 cents per bunch, and carnations are bringing 75 cents per dozen, and American Beauty roses 35, with tea roses going at \$1.50 to \$1.75.

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
