RUINED BY A HAIL STORM.

VISITORS BOMBARDER WITH THE ARTILLERY OF RAIN.

PEOPLES KILLED, THOUSANDS OF WOODEN HOUSES, FIELDS AND MEADOWS DESTROYED.

VISITORS, June 7.—The worst hail storm that ever visited this city commenced at 7 o'clock this morning. Dense, jagged-edged clouds rose with startling rapidity. The wind drove the dust in columns to the height of four-story houses. Then the hail began to fall, and covered the city in a short time to the depth of from six to eight inches.

In less than fifteen minutes the city looked as if it had been bombarded. It is estimated that 10,000 windows were broken. Five thousand glass windows were broken in the majority of exchange building stores, and in the saloons. In the upper stories of the sheriff's wing of the palace, hardly a pane remains unbroken.

The hail stones averaged in size of half an inch, and descended in the winds with tremendous force. Three deaths are reported, due to falling trees. Houses were frightened by the sound and ran away, causing numerous injuries.

Horrible damage was done in a field outside of Visalia, where a detachment of artillery, with thirty-two guns, were overthrown. The horses bolted with fright in all directions, scattering the gunners. Two men were killed, several of them were run over. One was killed, and three officers were severely injured.

The beautiful gardens of the city are ruined, and telegraph and telephone wires were torn down and broken. Trees were stripped of their bark, causing death to thousands of birds. It is feared that great damage has been done to crops.

Reports from Bakersfield show that place was also visited by a similar storm. The damage there was almost ruined. Violent storms have occurred during the week at different points, and immense damage is reported to have been done.
