

Wed. 8.--Samuel Cluff, of Provo, arrested on a charge of unl. coh.

Fri. 10.--C. C. N. Dorius, of Ephraim, Sanpete Co., and John J. Walser and Joseph S. Jones, of Payson, Utah Co., liberated from the Utah Pen., having served terms for unl. coh.

Sat. 11.--The steamship *Wisconsin* sailed from Liverpool, England, with 155 Saints, in charge of Levi Naylor. The emigrants landed in New York, August 24th and arrived in Salt Lake City, Sept. 1st--The Mackintosh Sampling Mills at Sandy, Salt Lake Co., was destroyed by fire; loss, \$10,000.

Sun. 12.--James H. Hart arrested at Bloomington, Idaho, on a charge of unl. coh.--A Latter-day Saint meeting was disturbed and broken up by the apostate Jarmin, at Swansea, Wales.

Mon. 13.--William Williams, of Hyrum, Cache Co., James Hansen, of Brigham City, and Samuel Taylor completed their terms in the Utah Pen., where they had served for unl. coh.--Elder Edmund Z. Taylor, of Ogden, died near Looklaid, Virginia, where he labored as a missionary. His body was sent to Utah for burial.

Tu. 14.--A earthquake shock was felt in Maine.--A terrible collision occurred off Sable Island between the steamers *Geiser* and the *Thingvalla* of the Thingvalla line, by which the *Geiser* sank with about one hundred people. The *Thingvalla* in a much damaged condition reached Halifax, Nova Scotia, on the 17th.

Wed. 15.--After a lengthy examination before Commissioner Norrell, Howard O. Spencer, accused of killing Ralph Pike, was admitted to bail in the sum of \$6,000.--Ephraim Briggs, of Bountiful, was liberated from the penitentiary, having served a term for breaking the Edmunds law.--Erik Ellasen, of Millville, Cache Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh.--A terrible thunderstorm passed over portions of Utah doing great damage.

Thurs. 16.--Samuel Obray arrested at Paradise, Cache Co., on a charge of unl. coh.--Daniel F. Thomas released from the Utah Pen.

Fri. 17.--At Blackfoot, Idaho, Alexander Woods, a negro was hanged for having killed his wife at Pocatello, May 5, 1887.--Reform School Commissioners locate school on donated Driving Park grounds, at Ogden, 35 acres.

Mon. 20.--John D. Jones arrested at Cherry Creek, Idaho, on a charge of unl. coh.

Tu. 21.--Rasmus Nielsen, of Hunter, Salt Lake Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh.

Wed. 22.--President Cleveland sent the nomination of several probate judges for the several counties in Utah to the Senate.

Thurs. 23.--J. W. Judd, of Tennessee, Utah's new associate justice, arrived in Ogden.

Fri. 24.--Thomas Harding, of Salt Lake City, Robert T. King and Joshua Adams, of American Fork, James G. Higginson, of Spanish Fork, and J. Leveridge, of Provo, were released from the Utah Pen., having served terms of imprisonment for living with their wives.--Bishop John Klenke, of Mona, Juab Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh.--A Democratic Political club was organized in Salt Lake City.

Sat. 25.--A Republican Political club organized in Salt Lake City.

Sun. 26.--The Hunter branch, Salt Lake Co., was organized into a Ward, with William Miller as Bishop.--Elliot Sanford, recently appointed chief justice for Utah, arrived in Salt Lake City. On the 27th he took the oath of office and superseded Judge Charles S. Zane.

Mon. 27.--Alexander Burt was released from the Utah Pen., having served a term for unl. coh.

Tu. 28.--Sewer District No. 1 created in Salt Lake City, and sewers ordered.

Wed. 29.--Olans Johnson, of Union, and Levi Curtis liberated from the Utah Pen.

Thurs. 30.--The court-house at Beaver, Beaver Co., was burned. Loss \$15,000.--Ira A. Brim put his head into a circle saw at Taylor, Romney and Armstrong's mill, Salt Lake City, with suicidal intent. He was terribly cut.--Charles Honey fell from the

top of a car, while the train was in motion, and was killed, near Woods Cross, Davis Co.

Fri. 31.--Bishop James C. Hamilton, of Mill Creek, Salt Lake Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh.--William Dewey, a young man, killed by a runaway in Salt Lake City.

#### SEPTEMBER.

During the month an unusually large number of disasters occurred on land and sea, such as ship-wrecks, collisions, cyclones, floods, storms, explosions, railway accidents and destructive fires.--Yellow fever also raged in Florida, Alabama and other States, and a large number of people died with it.--Cyclones in Cuba destroyed several villages; 800 people perished.--The book of Doctrine and Covenants translated by Elder J. M. Shodahl, was published in Salt Lake City.

Sat. 1.--Charles Stokes Gillman was shot and killed by Bailiff Ross McManamy, in Salt Lake City. The murderer was arrested.--Bishop John Spencer, of Indianola, Sanpete Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh.--The steamship *Wyoming* sailed from Liverpool, England, with 83 Saints in charge of Abraham Johnson. The company arrived in New York Sept. 11th, and at Salt Lake City the 19th and 20th.

Sun. 2.--Elders Elias S. Wright, Thomas Holt, A. L. Fuller and two others were dragged from their beds and fearfully beaten by a masked mob near Bell's Station, Tennessee, for having preached the Gospel.

Mon. 3.--Bishop A. McKinnon, of Randolph, Rich Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh.--Mads Christensen, of Farmington, Davis Co., released from the Utah Pen., having served his term for unl. coh.--Elder Henry Beckstead, died at South Jordan, Salt Lake Co.

Tu. 4.--Apostle Moses Thatcher arrested at Logan on a charge of unl. coh. On the 7th, after a preliminary examination, he was discharged for lack of evidence.

Wed. 5.--Thirty people killed by a railway accident in France.

Thurs. 6.--Wilson M. Allred released from the Utah Pen., having served six months for living with his wives.--Horace S. Eldredge, one of the First Seven Presidents of the Seventies, died in Salt Lake City.--Elders Andrew Jensen, Edward Stevenson and Joseph S. Black, left Salt Lake City, for the East to visit the "waste places of Zion" in the interest of Church history.

Fri. 7.--After preliminary examination before Commissioner Norrell, Seymour B. Young was discharged for lack of evidence.

Sat. 8.--R. W. Rasmussen fell from a precipice, 55 feet high, killing himself instantly, in Monroe Canyon, Sevier Co.

Sun. 9.--Elder Thomas Ezra Wrighton died at Brigham City.

Tu. 11.--An excursion party of Dakota editors visited Salt Lake City--Daniel Jones released from the Utah Pen.

Wed. 12.--Professor Richard A. Proctor, the distinguished astronomer, died in New York, with yellow fever.

Fri. 14.--Harvey H. Cluff released from the Utah Pen.

Sat. 15.--The steamship *Wisconsin* sailed from Liverpool, England, with 145 Saints on board, in charge of William G. Phillips. The company arrived in New York Sept. 25th, where twenty of the emigrants were arbitrarily detained by the officers on the pretense that they were paupers. The rest of the company arrived in Salt Lake City Oct. 2nd.

Sun. 16.--Beudt Larsen released from the Utah Pen.

Mon. 17.--Apostle George Q. Cannon, who had been in hiding for some time, surrendered himself to U. S. Marshal Dyer, pleaded guilty to two indictments charging him with unl. coh., and was sentenced in the Third District Court to 175 days' imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$450 and costs. On the same occasion Archibald N. Hill and W. J. Parkin were sentenced to 50 days' imprisonment and \$50 fine, each, and Samuel H. Hill to 60 days and \$75 fine, for unl. coh.--In the Swansea police court William Jarmin, who had incited the populace to riot against the Mormons, was placed under £100 bonds to keep the peace for three months.

Tu. 18.--In the Third District Court, Salt Lake City, by Judge Sanford, James Turner, of West Jordan, was sentenced to 50 days' imprisonment and \$30 fine, Daniel Lewis to 60 days and \$60 fine, Milford B. Shipp to 75 days and \$65 fine and Edwin L. Davis to 75 days and \$70 and costs, for unl. coh.--Bishop George Coleman, of Teasdale, Sevier Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh.

Wed. 19.--In the First District Court, at Provo, F. C. Boyer was sentenced to two months' imprisonment and \$200 fine and costs, and Jesse Gardner to three months and costs, for unl. coh.--Benjamin Perkins arrested on Carcas Creek, near Teasdale, Sevier Co., on a charge of unl. coh.

Thurs. 20.--The French seized the Marquesa Groups, in the South Sea after bloody fighting with the natives. Chili had seized Easter Island for the purpose of establishing a penal colony.

Fri. 21.--In the First District Court, at Provo, Niels L. Petersen was sentenced to five months' imprisonment for unl. coh.

Sat. 22.--In the First District Court, at Provo, Thomas Barrett was sentenced to four months' imprisonment and costs, Joseph B. Forbes to four months, and \$100 and costs, Elijah Bourne to five months and costs, C. P. Nielsen to three months and costs, William J. Lewis to five months and costs, Ebenezer Hunter to two months and costs, and Richard Bird to pay a fine of \$100 and costs, all for unl. coh.

Mon. 24.--Elder Henry Arnold died in Salt Lake City.--In the Third District Court, James Wostenholme, of Summit County, was sentenced to 65 days' imprisonment and \$65 fine, and Edwin Rawlings to 75 days and \$75 fine, for unl. coh.--In the First District Court, at Provo, Lewis Olsen and Poul Poulsen were sentenced to four months' imprisonment and \$200 fine and costs, each, Lars Larsen to three months and \$100 and costs, and Daniel King, Samuel Wagstaff and Reddick N. Allred to 60 days and \$50 fine, each, for unl. coh. Lars Frandsen was also sentenced to six months and costs for bigamy.--Henry Hamilton, Joseph Luncford, Silas G. Higgins, W. H. Bringham, Marcus Funk, John Tanner and Hyrum S. Church, liberated from the Utah Pen.

Wed. 26.--In the First District Court, at Provo, James Butler was sentenced to five months' imprisonment and Mons Nilson to four months and \$200 and costs, for unl. coh., and Baldwin H. Watts to one year for adultery. J. M. Dunning, who on the 22nd had been sentenced to six months and \$300 and costs, was imprisoned on the same day.--Great destruction to life and property is caused in Valparaiso, Chili, by a storm and the bursting of a reservoir.

Thurs. 27.--Judge Zerubbabel Snow died in Salt Lake City.--A. G. Stromberg, of Huntsville, Weber Co., released from the Utah Pen., having served two sentences for breaking the Edmunds law.--David Sanders arrested at Farmington, Davis Co., on a charge of unl. coh.--In the First District Court, Parley R. Young was sentenced to six months' imprisonment and \$150 fine and costs, and Hans Jensen to five months and costs, for unl. coh.--David H. Cannon, of St. George, gave himself up to U. S. deputy marshal, being wanted on a charge of unl. coh. After a preliminary examination the following day before Commissioner Julius Jordan, at Silver Reef, he was discharged.--In a battle in Samoa, King Tamasese was defeated by partisans of the deposed King Maitetia, and Mataafa was proclaimed king by the victors.

Fri. 28.--Sarah Ann Down, an alleged plural wife from Davis County, was arrested on a charge of fornication.--John Hoiner, of Marion, Cassia Co., Idaho, was accidentally shot by his hunting companions, being mistaken for a deer.

Sat. 29.--In the First District Court, at Provo, Lorenzo Argyle was sentenced to six months' imprisonment and \$150 fine and costs, John W. Gardiner to five months, Christian Sorensen to 90 days, William Beeston to four months and \$200 and costs, Christian Borregard to 60 days and \$50 and costs, and N. M. Petersen and David Broadhead to \$150 fine and costs, each, all for unl. coh., and Ole P. Borg to nine months and John Durrant to 18 months, for adultery.--
