MINUTES OF CONFERENCE
of the Southern Mission, held in St. George.

(Concluded.)
Bishop Charles N. Smith gave a good report of the people of Rockville, and advocated co-operation in farming.
Singing by the Swiss choir.
President E. Snow felt that since he had been presiding in this mission his mind has taken a very practical turn, but he did not feel to find fault with himself as he believed that the Lord had directed him thus. But we have appointed a presidency to this state of Zion to help me in my labors, and I will always be ready to give counsel and advice to those seeking for it. I wish the people to sustain me by their faith and prayers, and also to sustain the presidency of the state and the bishops and presiding officers in the same manner. In speaking of the value of constitutions to societies he said the faith and prayers of the Saints are better than all the constitutions that can be adopted.
After singing "How beautiful upon the mountains" the meeting was dismissed by Elder Jacob Gates.
