Dissolve a teaspoonful of alum in a
quarter of warm water. When cold, stir
in as much flour as will give it the
consistency of thick cream, being partic-
ular to beat up all the lumps; stir in as
much powdered rosin as will lay on a
dime, and throw in half a dozen cloves
to give a pleasant odor. Have on the
fire a teacup of boiling water, pour the
flour mixture in, stirring well all the
time. In a very few minutes it will be
the consistency of mush; let it cool;
lay a cover on, and put in a cool place.
When needed for use, take out a por-
tion and soften it with water. Paste
thus made will last twelve months. It
is better than gum, as it does not gloss
the paper and can be written on.—Ex.
