## LABOR DAY FESTIVITIES.

Elegant Preparations for a Grand Gala Day—Amusements of Every Description.

Next Monday, September 3rd, Labor day, promises to be one of the most important days in the history of Ogden, in the way of parades, sports and general amusements.
