BAD BLOOD AMONG THE MILITIA.

The Fight May Be Declared Off, if Permanent Injunction is Not Granted Today.

JACKSONVILLE, Jan. 23.—The troops came to town this evening, the entire second battalion of the Florida militia, in all 120.

There was no excitement among the spectators, who received the troops cordially, with an occasional cheer and occasional snarling remarks from militia who, picked up various members of the command for some planetary afflictions, such as "Hell, there, get on to tatty," etc.

The South American War.

NOW YORK, Jan. 23.—A British dispatch from Tegucigalpa, Honduras, says the city was attacked last night by a strong force of revolutionaries and Nicaraguans allies, succeeded in gaining entrance to the city through a hole in the outer defense batteries. Forty Honduras were killed and seventy wounded. The Nicaraguan loss was greater. Both sides are preparing for another battle. President Vasquez declared it impossible for the enemy to hold out much longer, while others now are being sent to the front.

DAMAGED BY A WAVE.

AN INSURGENT VICTORY.

Brazilian Government Troops Surrender to the Rebels.

Sharp Hand-to-Hand Battle for the Possession of an Island—Losses on Both Sides.

LONDON, Jan. 23.—The Times publishes the following, dated Rio Janeiro, January 20th, via Montevideo, January 22d: The insurgents attacked Macangus island. While the Aquitano made preparations to advance she kept a heavy fire with machine guns until 2:30. At 4 insurgents advanced, cutting the landing of three parties of twenty-seven men each, who, with a reserve of thirty men, were placed on Macangus. The rebels were repulsed, and immediately charged the government battery, capturing a Krupp field piece, one heavy Whitworth and a large supply of ammunition.

The insurgents turned the battery against the Aquitano, which responded at Moncagua and Panta do Arco. A sharp hand-to-hand fight took place on the strand and was maintained half an hour. At the expiration of this time the government troops surrendered.

The total loss in the government was as follows: Commanding officer and ten killed; fifteen wounded and three missing; and 100 men taken prisoners. The government loss on the main land and on Macangus must have been heavy. The insurgents had five killed and seven wounded.

The government's new warships are still at Pernambuco. The *Tirantes* and *Bahia* remain at Montevideo. The insurgents report having captured the *Almirante* and *Moncagua*. The *Moncagua* fired 2,000 cartridges, forty-eight Krupp guns, and a large supply of ammunition for the use of the revolutionaries.
