LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**CRIMINALS AND SLASHING.**—This morning two Chinamen entered into an altercation on Second South Street, about some financial matter, when one of them drew a double sword, having two formidable blades about twenty inches long, with which he cut a deep gash in the side of the other's head and neck.  
The wound passed downwards and inwards, partially dividing the sternum, and reaching the external carotid artery. The gash was seven inches in length, and required twenty stitches to bring the parts in apposition, and when closed by the surgeon, Dr. Crain, it would hardly be distinguished from the wound.  
The wounded man was attended to by Dr. S. E. Crain. The Chinaman who did the slashing was arrested, and awaiting examination before Justice Clinton. From the appearance of the weapon, or rather weapons, used, which we have seen, we should judge him to be a two-sword man.
