# "WOLVES" IN SHEEP WAGONS.

At the meeting of the Ministerial Aslociation in this city on Monday, Sepember 23rd, a preacher who figured some years ago in this city, and in othir places where he could obtain a hearing and subsequently went to Ohio, reported his recent "Missionary Work Among the Mormons." He stated that te had visited many "Mormon" homes where he was kindly received and entertained, as he had represented himself as traveling without purse or scrip, after the fashion of "Mormon" misdonaries. He had not made any converts, and said that "no special results were expected," but he was distributing literature for the purpose of showng the falsity of "Mormon" doctrines and the truth of the "Christian" religions. This preacher after stating that in his ppinion the "Mormons" are, as a general thing, sincere in their bellef, accounted for their hospitality and kindtess toward him by stating that it proceded from "a sort of tit-for-tat polky." knowing that they had missiontries of their own abroad. That is to say, they were very sincere and yet very hypocritical. They treated him sourteously, fed and lodged him rratuitously, because the "Mormon" Church had missionaries who traveled without purse or scrip, and they treated tim well in order that "Mormon" misionaries might be treated well. If that 's his notion of "sincerity" it is evilent that he has a very poor conception of the meaning of the term. Speaking of the "tit-for-tat policy." It would be interesting to know how much courtesy, hospitality or aid of any kind this itinerant sectarian ever extended to a "Mormon" missionary. In view of the facts in his case, the treatment accorded him in his recent peregrinations is rather of the kind inculcated by the Savior, in His doctrine of "Do good unto them who despitefully use you and persecute you." "If thine enemy hunger feed him; if he is thirsty, give him drink," for this man has proved himself in the past an enemy to the Latter-day Saints, a maligner of their character, a libeller of their doctrines, and ungrateful for the courtesies extended toward him. At the very time when he was being kindly received in Coalville, some years ago, where an audience was on several occasions provided for him, he wrote a most shameful, false and scandalous letter about the "Mormons" and sent it to the East, and was confronted in Coalville with the evidences of his duplicity and mendacity. Yet he is now back in this State accepting the hospitality of the people whom he has defamed, and after eating their bread and partaking of their salt, jeers at them for their "tit-for-tat policy." According to reports that have come to us in Eastern papers, this person has been receiving aid from plous peopie in Ohio and elsewhere to enable him to perform the "mislson" he is now undertaking. We have from time to time informed our readers of the progreas of the "sheep-wagon" method of proselytism, arranged at Cleveland, Ohio, under his auspices. The project for which money was required was to fit out a number of sheep-wagons containing an organ, a singer, a preacher and a lot of anti-Mormon literature. These to be taken through the settlements in Utah, with the view of capturing as many "Mormons" and their children as possible and perverting them from their Church and faith. How much he succeeded in raising for this purpose we are not at present abie to state, nor can we say how much he has actually expended for the sheepwagon which is doing duty in the northern part of Utah. But it is evident that he is making his living cheaply, by sponging upon the people whom he has made a business of misrepresenting.
