#### SELF-DESCRIBED.

"IT is straining matters mightily when gentlemen cannot call and pay their re-spects to a distinguished visitor, without being lied about by a journalistic sneak and prevaricator."

That is the closing paragraph of the leading editorial in this morning's Tribune. It is a poor attempt to discredit a statement of the Times, that the Tribune sent a delegation to ex-Congressman Horr to influence him in a certain direction. The Tribune indignantly, and of course ferociously, denied the Times statement. Whereupon the Times editor, in a gentleman ly way, corrected his remarks by saying that the editor of the Tribune went, in person, with two other per-BODS.

The Tribune is obliged to confess this fact, because the matter does not rest altogether with its scribes, and a flat denial could be disproved by reference to Mr. Horr. So they try to dodge the main question involved, by a roundabout attempt at explanation which actually proves the essential points in the Times array of facts.

It is because of the editor's rage over the exposition of the truth that he indulges in the remarks we have quofed. But they come back with boomerang effect upon his own pate. If two or three "Mormon" gentlemen call and pay their respects upon a distinguished visitor, are they not sure to be lied about by the Tribune gang? And if he expresses any views at all at issue with "Liberal" ends, is he not certain to be bedaubed by the same slingers of journalistic filth?

This is the course which the Tribune has pursued for years. And now when the truth is told concerning its own editor-with the exception of an error which does not affect the main facts, he flies into a rage and tries to ape the indignant "gentleman," while he plainly exhibits the qualities which are described in the last words of his own attack on the Times. It puts him in a very uncomfortable box and stamps his brow with his own epithets.
