BE CAREFUL AND WISE.

Some of our State legislators have had little or no experience in the important work of framing, amending and passing bills. We submit to them that they be extremely careful to keep within the lines of their legitimate powers. The judicial and executive branches of the State government are independent of the legislative in their sphere of action. It is in the interest of the people that they stand by their friends. Also bear in mind that nothing can be done which would be contrary to the Constitution of the United States. It would be a most foolish course to count anything which would be looked out on as the law of the land, for unconstitutional. Powers of the legislature should be in the hands of the people, and those members who are not lawyers would use these good common sense, practical suggestions and make them known to their constituents. If they do not, they might support them, if not with full strength, at least with some. This will be the public witness, a monument of constancy, or private ends and devices.

NO LEGISLATIVE TURSHING.

The election of United States senators for popular vote, we believe, would be a salutary change, if enacted. A constitutional amendment to that end, we think, would be supported by a large majority of popular sentiment throughout the country. That should be urged by those who are leaders of the change. But it would be well to take up this important question of necessary work. While the law stands as it is, the rest authority will remain, no matter how many constitutions or how many bills may be passed by the popular election in sections, or how many bills may be stamped with sectional or personal preferences.

Don't stay with this question of making up the Senate. Popular election of the Senate, the amendment to the present treaty, and the vote to be taken on the 6th of February. About the speaker is Senator Haynes. When the speaker is finally disposed of in the Senate, that body will have had its other considerations for about a month, without exception, or far as known, any new light upon the features of the treaty.

For the Paris agreement Spain requires all rights of sovereignty over and title to Cuba, and to the United States, Puerto Rico, the other West Indian islands and the Island of Guam unconditionally. The Philippines Islands are also "freed." The United States to pay \$25,000,000, presumably a large sum, to Spain. There is no mention of the Continental states. The British and American right high commission has agreed on all necessary Canadian questions except the number schedule, and was that to be fixed in a close bind during the coming week.

If the stories of Philip's outrages on Spanish civil prisoners in Cuba in only furnish the excuse to the Spanish to demand the complete independence of the treaty. The Senate, as the last place of consideration, the question will come up with the president after the ratification of the treaty, forcing the last duty of officially ending the war with Spain in the only manner consistent with the nation's honor.

It is evident that it is necessary to ratify the Treaty first. After that there will be ample time for discussing the proper disposition of the territory. Our instruments, however, are the United States.
